DEERFIELD-SHIELDS TIES WITH PROVISO

Locals Near Opponents' Goal when Game Ends Following Completed Pass

Deerfield's football men ended their third suburban league game in a tie last Saturday, October 26, when they met the Proviso football team at Maywood. Deerfield nearly made another touchdown to break the 12-12 score in the last fifty second of the game, but failed.

Snite Nearly Scores

With fifty seconds to go and the ball at about the middle of the field, O'Connor made a long pass which was received by Snite. Snite was downed on Proviso's 10-yard line, and the two following plays failed to put the ball over before the time was up.

In the first quarter, Berube kicked off for Deerfield. When Deerfield got the ball, they went for four successive first downs, and put the ball over for the first touchdown. Seyfarth's kick was blocked, leaving the score 6-0.

O'Connor Scores

Berube again kicked off, but the Proviso man who received the ball fumbled it, making it Deerfield's ball. Proviso provided stronger opposition this time and the ball soon changed hands. Then Maloney made a pretty catch of one of Proviso's passes and started another drive which resulted in Deerfield's second touchdown, made by O'Connor. Seyfarth's kick again failed to change the score.

Proviso Wakes Up

In the second quarter the battle waged back and forth until Hass, Proviso's captain and fullback, finally shoved the ball over the goal line for their first touchdown, leaving the score 12-6.

No addition to the score was made in the third quarter, both teams being fairly well matched until Bartlett sprained his ankle. Shortly after, Proviso nearly scored again, but fast playing on Deerfield's part brought the ball safely back out of the danger zone.

Score Tied

In the last quarter, after a hard struggle, Hass again put the ball over for Proviso, tying the score 12-12.

During the first half, the boys were a bit lax, but after realizing that they were handicapped by 14 points, they tightened up and took to heart every gain the opposing team made.

Referee Familiar

At the Oak Park game a week ago there was some question as to whether the "refs" were giving us a square deal, and there was some excitement among the Deerfield fans who went to Proviso when it was learned that two of the "refs" were the ones who were at Oak Park last week. However, everyone thought the game was fair enough.

Many Substitutions

There were quite a few substitutions during the game, but the first half started with the customary line-up.

OUST OFFICIAL OF OAK PARK RENOWN
