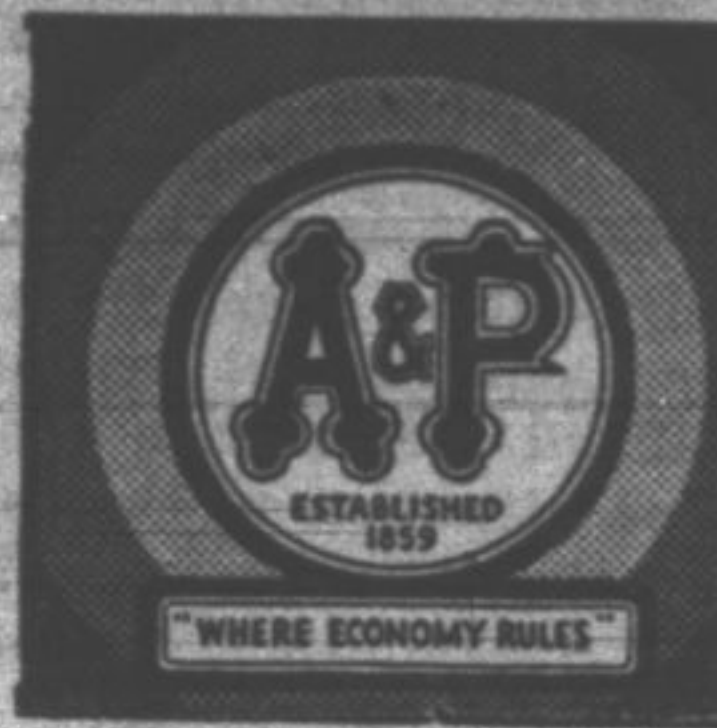

Relatives of Missing

The Adjusted Compensation Act was amended on May 29, 1928, allowing wives, children, mother and father the benefits of Federal Adjusted Compensation where the veteran has been missing for seven years or more. The final date for making a claim under this act is January 1, 1930.

The Comptroller General in a decision released August 23, 1929, holds that the claims for benefits of this act must be made by the next of kin, before the expiration of the seven-year period since the disappearance of the veteran. Claims actually submitted after the expiration of the seven-year period are not payable according to the decision.

The American Legion is, therefore, requesting eligible parties to make claims immediately if the veteran is missing, irregardless of the date of his disappearance, so that at the expiration of the seven-year period the claim can be approved by the Veterans' Bureau.

Dismisses Action Against Cab Company

Dr. Franklin C. Patterson, of Lake Bluff, who was given a verdict for \$4,500 damages against the Highland Park Yellow Cab company and Nick Brandonisio, Highwood truck driver, last week dismissed the action against the cab company and had Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards enter judgment against Brandonisio.

Counsel for the defendant, is to appeal to the appellate court. Dr. Patterson was an occupant of a cab that collided with the truck which was backing out of driveway, according to the bill in the case.
