Holy Cross Church Will Celebrate 20th Anniversary Nov. 10

In commemorating the Twentieth Anniversary of the parish, the first pastor, now pastor of St. Sylvester's parish in Chicago, Monsignor Thomas F. Quinn will sing a Solemn High mass at eleven a. m., Sunday, November 10th, assisted by the Rev. J. K. Fielding, pastor of St. Patrick's church, Everett, as deacon, and the Rev. John B. Scanlon, pastor of Our Lady of Solace church, Chicago, as subdeacon. The Rev. John O'Hearn, pastor of St. Mary's church, Lake Forest, will be master of ceremonies. Music will be rendered by a select choir.

In the year 1909, the little village of Deerfield was without a Catholic church and the Catholics all attended services at Highland Park, three miles east of Deerfield. Despite the bitter cold winters, the devout people hitched up the horses to their buggies, driving through snow and sleet and never a murmur was heard. So the good Lord rewarded them for the piety and sent them a priest, the Rev. Thomas Quinn, who took charge of Everett and Deerfield and worked untiringly. He went through many hardships, such as driving a horse and buggy to Deerfield for first mass a distance of four miles, in very cold weather, and returning to Everett for a later mass, but he felt he was repayed for his services by the cooperation and good will of the people who worked with him. He lived in the Duffy residence and had mass there every morning and at the home of the J. C. Ender family was cheerfully given for the Sunday mass.

Then the task of building a church started. A meeting was called to arrange for the building of the Deerfield church. Those who attended were the members of the Ender, Duffy, Karch, Kress, Wolf, Love, Franken, Ryan, Schneider, Dawson, Zahnle and Knickerbocker families. Then the problem of a building-site was the next to be solved but was easily settled through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Duffy, Sr., who donated 50 feet of their property for the church. The building then began and soon there was a very pretty little church which was dedicated Oct. 28, 1909 by Archbishop Quigley. 22 priests were in attendance at this dedication, which was a great epoch in the history of the Catholic church of Deerfield.

Father Quinn labored zealously for seven years between Everett and Deerfield, until he was sent to take a larger parish in Joliet. After a few years there, he was changed to St. Sylvester's parish where he is at the present time. In 1926 His Eminence Cardinal Mundelein conferred the honor of Monseigneur on him.

He also formed the Altar and Rosary society of which Mrs. J. C. Wolf was the first president. The meetings were held at the homes of the different members; business first
