A huge party and dance will be given jointly by the North Shore Line band and the Evans-Watkins Post No. 753, American Legion, on Friday evening, November 1, at the Valencia Ballroom, Waukegan. The festivities will start promptly at 8:30. Special entertainment will be provided, featuring the Pullman Porters' quartet, the nationally known singers who broadcast each Sunday evening over WGN. Other radio acts are on the program. Several Chicago Loop vaudeville acts will also be on the program. Music for the dancing will be provided by the Valencia Troubadours, led by Ray Black, of Libertyville. Although the party and dance is to be given by employes of the North Shore Line, the general public is also welcome. Part of the proceeds will be used to outfit the "Road of Service" band with new and distinctive uniforms. The band, which is led by Earl P. Shultis, of Waukegan, is in popular demand throughout the Metropolitan Area for parades, concerts, and various civic functions. E. T. Gurney, Waukegan, is president of the band. The Evans-Watkins Legion Post, co-sponsor of the party and dance, was formerly known as the North Shore Railroad Post. and then the social hour, and it is with the fondest recollections that the Altar and Rosary society looks back to the first years of their organization. In 1916 Father William Ryan succeeded Father Quinn and worked just as zealously as his predecessor. Although Father Ryan was in poor health, he attended to his duties uncompromisingly and it was a great shock, not only to the Catholic church when we heard of his death, November 30, 1928 but to everyone in the village of Deerfield because he was beloved by all.

For two years previous to Father Ryan's death, Rev. J. K. Fielding, like the other priests, labored zealously and conducted the parish just as he thought Father Ryan would have done, making no changes whatsoever. Then in June 1929, when the people of Deerfield church heard they were not to be a mission parish, but a parish with a resident priest, it was that the dreams of the Catholics were realized by the sending of the present pastor, Rev. C. L. McDonough, by his Eminence the Cardinal. Father McDonough is doing noble work and it will be only a few short years before the little church in Deerfield will be second to none.

Under the leadership of Father McDonough, the church has been remodeled; a new basement put in suitable for social purposes and a new heating plant installed. Many enjoyable affairs will be held during the winter months. The erection of a school and rectory are future ambitions of the Catholic people, another interest and loyalty to their church form an interesting chapter in the progress of the church.

All former parishioners are invited to be with us on the occasion of this celebration.
