Hearing This Month On Track Elevation In N. S. Communities

Application of city officials of Highland Park, Glencoe, Kenilworth and other north shore communities asking that the North Shore railroad be required to elevate or depress its tracks through these communities will be the basis of a hearing before the Illinois Commerce Commission in Chicago this month. Regarding this matter the Waukegan Sun comments as follows:

"The movement it is believed will result in general agitation along the north shore for the elevation of not only the tracks of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad but for those of the Chicago and North Western railway as well.

"It is also believed in the event that the railroad company is forced to elevate its tracks to a point as far north as Highland Park that it will eventually be called upon to elevate them through Highwood, Lake Forest and Lake Bluff and possibly North Chicago, but as the trains of this company enter Waukegan on the city streets and are regarded as part of the street railway system the plan will not be extended to this city.

"The possibility of the elevation of the tracks of the Chicago and North Western railway have been discussed for years, but no definite action has ever been taken to bring about this improvement. Many believe that the action started before the Illinois Commerce Commission in relation to the tracks of the North Shore line may have its effect in bringing about similar action in regard to the North Western railroad."

Elect John L. Udell Member Park Board

At a meeting of the East Park District board held Tuesday evening, John L. Udell was elected a member of the board to fill the unexpired term of L. R. Rigdon, who recently resigned. Two names were submitted, those of Dr. Bosworth and John L. Udell. On the first ballot there was no choice. Some discussion followed about local business men being represented on the board, and Mr. Udell, being in business here, it was thought that he would be available at all times. On a second ballot, therefore, Mr. Udell received a majority of the votes cast and was duly declared elected.

Highland Park Man On Trial On Charge Of Murder of Woman

Trial of George Sullivan 49, of Highland Park on a charge of murdering Mrs. Lenora McGraw, 52, in the latter's home a few months ago, was begun Monday in the circuit court, and by Tuesday afternoon a jury had been secured to hear the case. A couple of dozen of witnesses were to be examined, it was intimated, and it was expected that at least two days would be occupied with the testimony and the summing up of the attorneys. State's Attorney A. V. Smith and his assistant S. H. Block are prosecuting and Attorney A. C. Henry was appointed by the court to defend Sullivan, according to reports from Waukegan.

Counsel for Sullivan expected to prove through Charles McGraw, husband of the dead woman, that Sullivan had been a boarder in their home for 18 years by common consent, and that he had been as one of the family.

Through McGraw the defense attorney will attempt to shatter the theory of the prosecution of an illicit love affair and jealousy, culminating in the slaying of the woman.

Col. Smith, with a chain of circumstances built up by Highland Park police, will show that Mrs. McGraw was a cured drug addict, as was Sullivan, and that he nursed her to health. He will show that Sullivan helped in the housework and was home during the day a large part of the time.

Through John Mahoney and G. M. Jones, former roomers, the state will show that Mrs. McGraw went riding with them on the afternoon of Aug. 3, a few hours before she was found bruised, beaten and dying in her home. Sullivan found the body, he told police, and his shirt was covered with blood and his chest with scratches.

The defense will admit this, according to the outline of the proposed procedure, and will point out that one of the former boarders struck Sullivan and that he received the scratches in mending an automobile tire.

The jury is composed of Nelson Drom, Erving Elms, Fred Cribbe, and Elmer Hunter, of Antioch; D. M. Simpson, Highland Park; David Flagg, Libertyville; Emil Johnson, Lake Forest; E. A. Dunakin, Hugh Kelly, Cornelius Daley, J. P. Wyllie, and G. H. Simpson, all of Waukegan.

CITY WANTS GATES ON DEERFIELD AVE.

Council Votes to Petition Commerce Commission; Other Business

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening the corporation counsel was authorized to prepare petitions to the Illinois Commerce Commission asking for the installation of gates installed at the crossings of both the North Shore line and the Northwestern railroad on Deerfield avenue, near Blodgett.

The action was taken when it was reported by the corporation counsel that he had been advised that the Northwestern was willing to install wig-wag signals at their crossing. The city clerk also was authorized to write the Northwestern, protesting against the obstruction of the crossings on Deerfield road at Blodgett by freight trains, regarding which there has been much complaint.
