All of the 25 players in "Aladdin" are dramatic students in the School of Speech, with the exception of some of the slaves, who are played by high school boys.

Mayor of Cincinnati
to Occupy Pulpit of
Congregation Israel

The Honorable Murray Seasongood, mayor of Cincinnati, will occupy the pulpit of North Shore Congregation Israel, Lincoln and Vernon avenues, Glencoe, next Sunday morning, November 10, at 11 o'clock.

"Has Religion a Place in Politics?" is the theme upon which Mayor Seasongood will speak.

Mayor Seasongood occupies a unique place in the civic and political life of American municipalities, as he led the city manager charter fight which made Cincinnati the first large city in America to be governed under this plan. Russell Wilson, in an article on Mayor Seasongood, which appeared in the National Municipal Revue of February, says the following of Mayor Seasongood:

"Mayor Seasongood's leadership is not owing to patronage or to the political privileges that often emanate a mayor. It is entirely a moral leadership. . . . Above all, Mr. Seasongood aroused good citizens from their lethargy. . . . From being the worst governed city in the United States, Cincinnati has become the best governed. . . . As a rule I am opposed to monuments. But some day Cincinnati should raise one to Mayor Seasongood, a cultured gentleman who imparted his political ideals to his fellow-citizens. He has suffered some of the pains of a prophet, but he is not, nor shall he be, without honor in his own city. . . . Mr. Seasongood is an excellent speaker, felicitious in phrase and cogent in logic, with an uncanny ability of resurrecting the pet anecdote. He hit the extra levy with the bludgeon of humor and stabbed it with the rapier of wit."

At this service the Temple choir will sing the national anthems of Russia, Germany, France, England and America in observance of Armistice day.

The game was tied up to the beginning of the fourth quarter, after which the Deerfield boys tore through Evanston for three more touchdowns.

Deerfield Scores First
Deerfield kicked-off with the wind to begin the game. Evanston returned the kick and worked the ball back to the center of the field. Then Deerfield got the ball and shoved it well back into Evanston's territory. A pass from O'Connor to Berube completed the drive for the touchdown. Seyfarth's kick was blocked, leaving the score 6-0 in Deerfield's favor.

Evanston made a good return of Berube's kick and began a hard drive toward Deerfield's goal. They continued the drive in the beginning of the second quarter and finally Levis scored Evanston's first touchdown.

With the ball back near their goal-line, Evanston tried to kick, but it was blocked. Moon got the ball and then fumbled it, Berube picked it up, and between them they put the ball over to again put Deerfield in the lead. Again Seyfarth's kick was blocked; the score standing 12-6 till the end of the first half.

During the last part of the second quarter, there was an epidemic of penalties, Deerfield getting the first one, a fifteen yard set-back. Within two minutes however, Evanston got a 15 yard penalty, putting the ball back again. Before the end of the quarter Evanston got two more small penalties for off-sides.
