Interesting Lectures, Exhibits and Study Classes; Ernest Bacon Coming

The first week in November is filled with absorbing lectures, exhibits and study classes for members of the Highland Park Woman's club.

Friday, November 1, Mrs. Lieber gave a stimulating talk on "New Laws That Affect Our Homes." The parliamentary drill which followed was greatly enjoyed.

November 4 to 16, an exhibit of sculpture shown by Dawes, Boynton, and Sherwin will be on display.

Talks on Etching

Monday afternoon Ralph Fletcher Seymour gave a brief resume of the past history of etching, beginning with caveman's scratching on rocks and utensils. He told of etching, as we know it, being used first on armour and later on metal playing cards. Later, after the advent of paper the artist began copying pictures and made illustrations for books. He spoke of the great Albrecht Durer, of Rembrandt, and other outstanding etchers of the past.

Next he told of more modern men in different countries and described their styles and achievements. Different methods of producing etchings were described such as dry points, aquatints.

Etching, according to Mr. Seymour's statement, is the most direct means known of conveying the artist's impressions and personality. He said that the art is very popular at present, not only with artists but with the public as well.

Court to Talk Nov. 13, Ravinia Woman's Club

Miss Kawin's splendid theoretical training, her experience as a social worker in a non-legal capacity, as well as the years spent on juvenile research in collaboration with the eminent child psychologist, Dr. Herman Adler, assigned to the Juvenile court, render her singularly qualified to speak on the subject she has elected. After the salient points have been covered as adequately as may be in the allotted time Miss Kawin will gladly enter into an informal discussion with the members.
