PLAN ACTIVITIES FOR HOME ROOM

For the purpose of having advisers come to know the individual students in their home rooms more intimately, so that they can help each student with the problems confronting him, and for the purpose of utilizing the home room period to the best advantage, a faculty committee of eight has recently decided upon a list of things to do during home room and has planned a weekly program of activities.

One feature of the new plan is to have a student chairman and a student secretary-treasurer elected in each home room who, together with the councilor of that home room, will carry on the assigned programs which are to take place on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Certain parliamentary rules, a list of which is given each adviser, will be observed during these programs.

Adviser Should Help Students

"Each adviser should conduct the home room period as though he were a principal of a small school," says Mr. Sandwick in regard to the plan. The home room teacher, he says, should advise each pupil about his work and his schedule and should try in every way to help the student make as great a success as possible out of his school life.

Under the new plan a record will be kept of the grades, blue cards, citizenship, activities, etc., of each student as well as of more intimate information regarding the student. These records will be kept in a steel file in the home room, and will be referred to from time to time as the need arises.

Bibliography Made Out

A bibliography of books helpful in the home room discussions will also be handed out to the teachers.

"Every home room teacher is expected to consider himself personally responsible for the students making a success of their school work," says Mrs. Martin, the chairman of the faculty committee which made out the list of activities given below. The others on the committee are: Miss Bredin, Mr. Wolters, Miss Perry, Mr. Barnes, Mr. Burwell, Miss Rodenbeck, and Br. Ballard.

If any revision in the list considered advisable, the faculty committee will meet and discuss it, either rejecting or accepting the revision, as needed.

Weekly Program

A weekly program of activities during this period has been suggested, as follows:

Monday: Study and personal interviews.

Tuesday: Reading Shoreline and extending acquaintances among students.

Wednesday: Report of councilor meeting. Assigned program calling for preparation.

Thursday: Assigned program.

Friday: General assembly.
