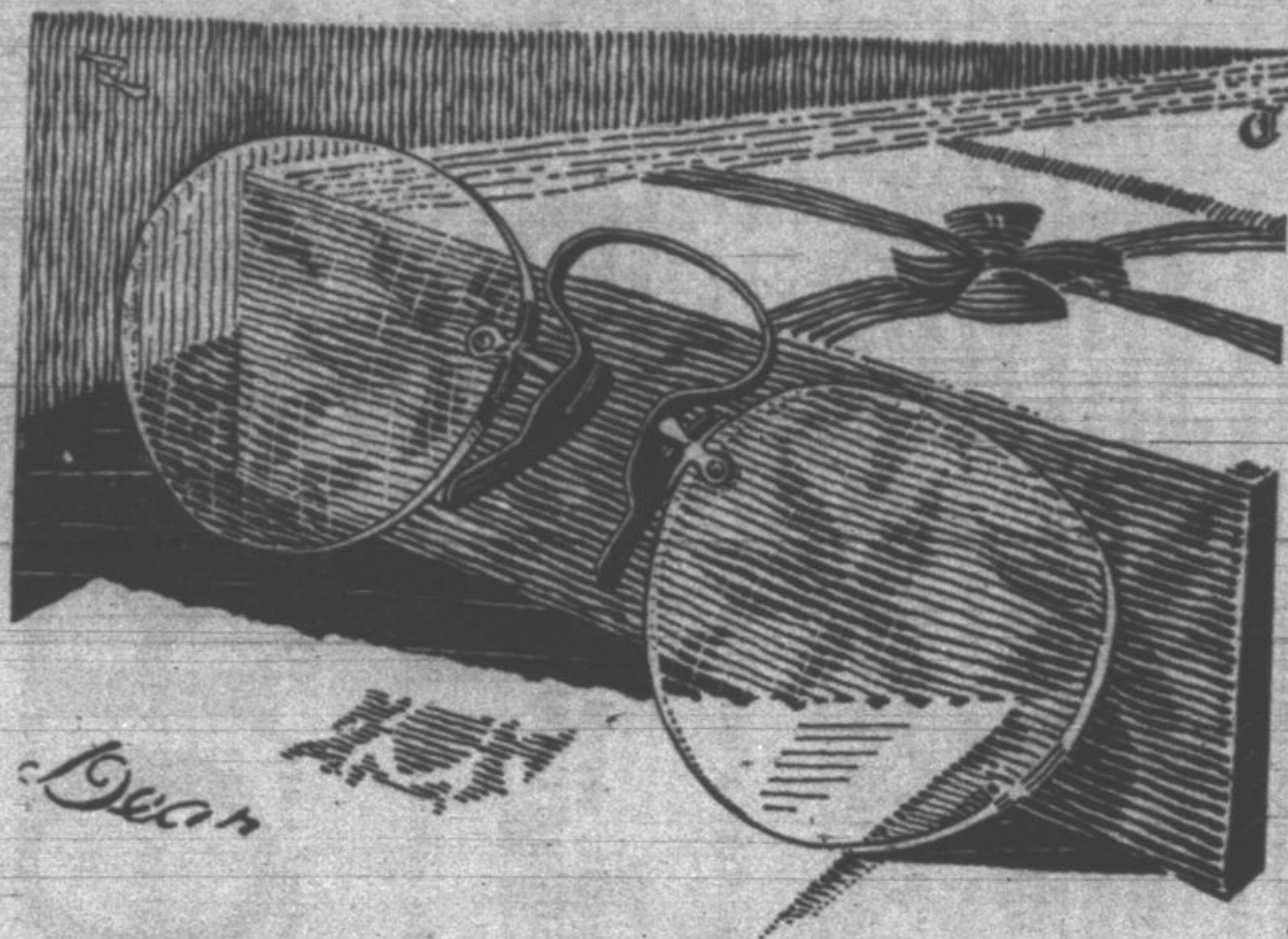


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NEW SCHOLARSHIP RECORD AT DEERFIELD-SHIELDS H.S.

That the highest scholarship average in the history of Deerfield-Shields has been attained for the first six weeks period, is shown by the graduation competition honor roll as made out by Mr. Pertz, school statistician. Out of a total of 4033 solid subjects taken, only 4.48 per cent of these were failures.

Of the entire school, Miss MacMartin's home room of senior girls receives first place, both in the greatest per cent of A's and in the least number of failures—none. Miss Mills' junior boys home room has the best attendance record, with 99.33 per cent average.

On the list of individual honors, posted in Shields Hall, Mr. Wolters' senior session took first place with four students on both the first and second ranks. Miss Lauderdale's freshmen session ran a close second with three students on the first honor roll, and four on the second.

All home rooms have been graded according to: (1) highest per cent of A's, (2) lowest per cent of failures, and (3) best attendance. Following is a chart showing the rank of all home rooms according to classes:
