

Memorial to Illinois Veterans at Memphis

A monument commemorating the service of 2,000 Illinois soldier dead who lie beneath the bluffs of Chickasaw was recently dedicated at Memphis in the presence of Union and Confederate veterans and dignitar-

ies of Illinois and Tennessee. The monument was built from an appropriation by the Illinois general assembly. Wreaths from President Hoover, the secretary of war, Governor Louis L. Emmerson of Illinois, the Tennessee governor and from Union and Confederate veterans' organizations flanked the monument.

Brief News Items

A new type of bad check passer, who is known to have victimized at least three Waukegan retail merchants and may have fleeced others, is being sought by the police.

Seven would-be hunters were arrested near North Chicago by Constable Francis Beckman and Chief of Police Frank Tiffany and booked at police headquarters for trespassing. Each paid a fine of \$15 and costs and was released.

So far \$40,000 has been subscribed for the proposed hotel-theater building for Antioch. The plan is for a 60-room hotel and a 1,000 capacity theater. The finance plan met with the approval of Chase Webb of the Antioch State bank, it was reported.

Paul Peterson, former Waukegan man who was last week found guilty of slaying his sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Riggs, at their farm home near Neillsville, Wis., is automatically sentenced to life imprisonment and is to begin to serving his time at once in the Wisconsin state state penitentiary at Waupun.

fine generalship, beside making a good many yards in his runs and plunges. Johnston starred for Evanston, although he did not score either of their touchdowns. "Ritchie" O'Connor did most of the passing for Deerfield. Two of his passes scored touchdowns, one to Seyfarth and one to Berube. Snite made some good kicks while he was taking Berube's place at right end.

Evanston Ties Again

In the third quarter Evanston made a strong comeback and soon were a close to Deerfield's goal. After a couple of plays, Woods, a second string man, put the ball over the line to tie the score a second time. The kick failed to make a change in the score. During the rest of the quarter Deerfield offered some real opposition to Evanston, neither side scoring.

In the last quarter things changed rapidly. Deerfield drove the ball well into Evanston's territory, a pass from O'Connor to Seyfarth scoring a touchdown in the first few minutes. Then Seyfarth did the unexpected by passing to Segert, who scored the point, making the count 19-12.

Evanston Weakens

It was not long after that the playing was again down in Evanston's danger zone. Seyfarth then proceeded to shove the ball through the fray for Deerfield's fourth touchdown, setting off a wild demonstration in the stands. Bartlett made a plunge and scored the point.

Evanston checked the onslaught for a short time but their work was mostly in vain. Bartlett took the ball and made the fifth touchdown for Deerfield, putting Evanston hopelessly behind. Seyfarth then kicked and scored the point, making the score 33-12 in Deerfield's favor, and putting Evanston back one place in the race for the league championship.

Deerfield Has Good Line

Segert, Snite, and Berube, who played ends, all did fine work. Segert scored one point while Berube scored one touchdown by himself and one with Moon. It was hard to tell who made the touchdown, or even whether it was made or not. Benvenuti, Carrol, Maiman, Lester, and Moon all played wonderful games. Moon blocked two kicks.

Fine Backfield

In the backfield, Daugherty and Maloney displayed great football ability. Bartlett, who was not in at the beginning sure was hitting that line hard.

Evanston tried several passes during the game but few of them were completed. They made one double pass, something rarely seen and nearly scored by it.
