> Way to Tie Neckerchief One of the conspicuous features of

the jamboree was the gay scar neckerchief worn by the American scouts. It added more to the pict esqueness and color of the scout of form than any single feature. N that the neckerchief is the only ficial neckwear, it is extremely portant that scouts tie it correct

The proper method of tying

neckerchief is described in the se diary and in the handbook for bo Attention is called to the good to knot appearing at the loose ends the neckerchief. This is an overh knot permitting the neckerchief be easily slipped off in time of ergency. It is a constant remin of the daily good turn. First f the neckerchief once to get the angle. According to the size of boy, turn the long edge over ab three inches smoothly, once or tw or even three times, to insure neckerchief's lying smoothly at back and hanging correctly in fro Place around the neck over the lar of the shirt, insert the slide over the ends to the point where knot would be if tied as a fourhand neck-tie. Then tie the t loose ends in an overhand knot, if it were one piece of material. slide may consist of the official Tur head, or it may be one made by boy himself from any material chooses, leather, horn, wood, tu shell.

It is a good idea to suggest your patrols that the slide should come the specific sign of the pat in the same way that the neck chief is the characteristic mark emblem all their own a little bit that intangible thing called pat spirit may be developed inside of patrols.
