Toys and Athletic Goods

A complete line of toys and athletic goods will be found on the large second floor which, with the exception of sports apparel for men, will be devoted entirely to youth. Here may be found a complete line of infant's wear, girls' outer wear and junior millinery. Clothing and furnishings for boys and suits for young men also will be found on this floor. There will be a special section devoted to men's suits and overcoats.

The waiting rooms will occupy a section of the third floor. In connection will be found the beauty salon and children's and women's barber shop. Also on this floor will be found fancy goods, books, all lines of millinery, including French, debutante, American, sports and street and the well known Field \$10 line. In addition, the third floor will house sections devoted to linens, bedspreads, quilts, blankets, comforts, domestic cottons, silks, linings, velvets, rayon, lingerie, corsets, knit underwear, negligees and maids' uniforms.

The fourth floor will be devoted to women's apparel, including coats, furs, suits, sports apparel, misses' dresses and negligees, blouses and shawls, house dresses, moderate priced dresses, misses' coats and suits and extra size coats and dresses.

Furniture and house furnishings will be found on the fifth floor where also will be located the general offices of the store. Linoleums, carpets, domestic rugs, lace curtains and materials, draperies and upholstery fabrics, cretonnes and curtain hardware and shades will be on this floor.

The lower floor sales area will be devoted to artwares, gifts, glassware, lamps, china, candlesticks, shades, household utilities and pictures.


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
