"The Poor Little Rich Girl," the annual fall play of the Deerfield-Shields high school, directed by Miss Zoe Comer, will be given in the high school auditorium Saturday night at 8:15.

#### Twenty-four in Cast

There are 24 actors in the cast, Lois Fehr, a deminutive girl, 57 inches high, with golden, curly hair, takes the part of the Poor Little Rich Girl.

The father and big business man of the play is John Hubly, and playing opposite him in the role of the society woman is Mary Tyson. The governess is played by Mary Rockwell, while the part of the mean, villainous nurse is taken by Phyllis Dexter.

Both box offices will be open the night of the performance to take care of the crowd more rapidly.

In all, more than one hundred students are aiding to make "The Poor Little Rich Girl" a success. This includes students from the industrial arts, sewing, art, and journalism departments, as well as the senior drama class and individual students.
