Five-Room Apartment to Be Novel Feature of Field's New Store

A five-room model apartment, furnished as completely as a modern apartment dwelling, will be one of the many outstanding features of the house furnishing floor in the new Evanston store of Marshall Field & Company soon to open on the north-west corner of Sherman avenue and Church street.

The model apartment will present the appearance of a real apartment built within the confines of the store and is expected to attract the attention of every apartment dweller interested in keeping pace with modern fashions in house furnishings and decorations.

It will consist of five rooms, living room, dining room, sun parlor and two bedrooms. All furnishings will be chosen to come within the means of the average family. Prices of the various pieces of furniture and accessories will be found in a panel on the wall of each room so that customers may know at a glance the cost of duplicating the entire room, or of separate articles of furniture.

There will be an expert interior decorator in the apartment at all times to give advice on current fashions in decoration and furniture. The furniture will be changed every few months in order to present a variety of ideas. The house furnishings floor, where the model apartment will be found, will be the fifth or top floor of the building.

A number of other attractive features are incorporated in the new store. On the third floor will be a large beauty salon offering all the modern aids to feminine loveliness. Included as part of the salon will be a poudre dispensary, where different shades of powder will be weighed, mixed and blended to suit the individual complexion. Also in connection will be ten hair-dressing rooms, a barber shop for women and children, kitchen for making and mixing dyes, booths for finger-waving and other modern beauty aids, grouped around a large reception room finished in modernistic style.

Women's apparel will be found on the fourth floor, a feature of which will be an evening room for the leisurely selection of formal evening apparel. Other distinctive features include a large millinery salon, a young men's room in English style, for selection of young men's clothing, gift bureau, where gift suggestions from the store's complete merchandise stocks are gathered, layette room, separate section for the selection of riding habits, accessories, etc., an infants' furniture section and a complete book section.

Officials of Marshall Field & company expect to announce the definite date of the new store's opening within the next few days. Opening week will be celebrated the week after the store opens. Executives of the company will be present during the opening day and at various times during opening week.

The administrative staff and special teachers will also be in their proper rooms and offices for persons who desire to see them.

Following the regular schedule of classes, there will be a short program in the assembly, including a talk by Mr. Sandwick and musical numbers by the Boys Glee club and a sextette from the orchestra.

The school special will leave Lake Bluff at 2 o'clock for parents and students, and all northbound trains will stop at Vine avenue.
