"Aladdin," presented by the Children's Theatre of Evanston, was enthusiastically received by a large audience. Radiant childhood was joyous in meeting others and showing the thrilling adventures unfolding before them. The hush of expectancy before the curtain rose, the intense absorption in the action, the thrill of the climax, all proved that to more than nine hundred children, Aladdin was very real. Appropriate music added to the play and was furnished by the North Shore Music shop of Evanston and Winnetka.

The second play, Ivanhoe, by the Goodman Players, will be given Thursday, Jan. 2, at 2:30 p. m. at Elm Place school auditorium. A large portion of the tickets for this play have already been sold and, judging by the reception of the last play, seats will be unobtainable unless reservations are made early.

Ernest Bacon

Ernest Bacon, pianist and composer, made a most finished talk and performance on Monday afternoon. Mr. Bacon who appeared as the exponent of modern music began by explaining the development of the singing tone in instruments. Beethoven thought vocally through the orchestra. Mr. Bacon is trying to develop vocal attitude through playing. He then played an Aria by Scarlotti, and Variations in A Major—a Sonata by Mozart as an example of the Viennese period. age. Everyone is musical according to Mr. Bacon, but although music is the principal art these days, it is a decadent age in music as there is so little composing.

Bach could play in any scale. Mozart used finger playing, using the clavichord. It was not until Beethoven's time that the hammar piano came into use.

Mr. Bacon then played most sympathetically Brahms' Intermezzo in D Flat Minor and Brahms' Rhapsody in E Flat Major. Next he played his own music from the Roumanian Suite, and Walt Whitman's Beat, Beat, Drums, which he had set to music as an encore, he played Intermezzo by Brahms. It was a most instructive and delightful musical experience.
