Art Leagues Join N. S. Winter Show

At the invitation of the Chicago Woman's club active working members of the North Shore Art league, the Oak Park Art league, and the South Shore Art league are joining to participate in the annual mid-winter show of the Woman's club, opening next Sunday, Nov. 17. Due to the limited space available entries for this exhibition were selected by a jury, about fifteen being selected from each group. The paintings will be hung until December 1, a reception and tea marking the opening on Sunday.

Responding to the insistent urge that all of the fine arts be represented in one great exhibition on the North Shore, the Winter exhibition of the North Shore Art league this year will include examples of the work of those who work in iron, pottery, weaving, and other fine arts. It has been decided to open this exhibit to producing artists on the North Shore who are not members of the league. With this invitation for a general participation by all those interested in arts and crafts, it is expected a very representative and interesting exhibition will result.

All entries for this Winter show must be in by Monday, Dec. 9, so that the pictures may be hung and exhibits arranged in time for the opening reception Wednesday, Dec. 11 at Mats hall, Winnetka community house.

At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the Art league comprehensive plans were laid for the series of monthly meetings to be held this winter. Mrs. Frank Peyraud of Highland Park, chairman of the committee, announced that Cornelius Osgood, noted archaeologist, ethnologist and Arctic explorer of the University of Chicago, had been secured for the meeting in Campfire room of Winnetka community house on Nov. 20. Other prominent men in art work have been lined up for future meetings, which are open to the public.

The evening art class, under the direction of George Oberteuffer of the Chicago Art Institute, is under way at the Winnetka community house with nearly twenty entered. These classes will continue on Thursday evenings until Christmas, when there will be an intermission until after the holidays, when they will be resumed for a period of ten weeks.
