Miss Anna Bahr entertained the members of her sewing club last night at her home on Laurel avenue. Mr. Olaf Lindbloom who has been

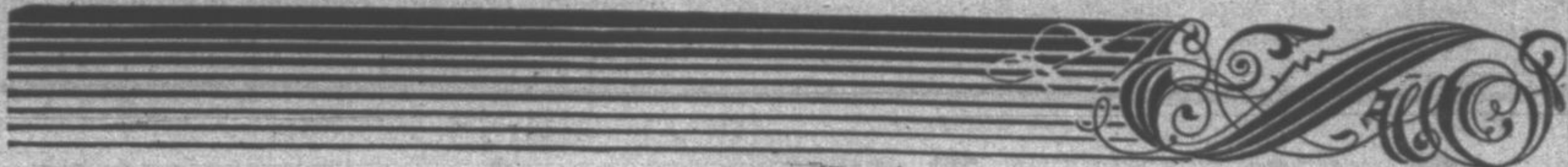
on the sick list for the past three weeks is much improved.
