**Building and Loan Ass'n. Holds Annual Meeting**

At the annual meeting of the Deerfield Building and Loan association held Monday evening of this week, four new directors were elected to fill vacancies, i.e., W. W. Geary, Dan Hunt, Sol. Shapiro and E. L. Vineyard. Ambrose Montavon was re-elected.

The new board of directors organized and elected F. L. Labahn as president and Dan Hunt as vice president for the ensuing year—Messrs. Selig and Getty being re-elected to the position of treasurer and secretary.

The fifth series of shares which were open for subscription during the month of October were the most successful of any since the organization was formed, 800 new shares of monthly stock and over \$4,000 in paid up stock having been subscribed.

Figures submitted at the meeting showed that the association is enjoying a very substantial growth, a number of mortgage loans having been made to members during the past year, and other loans are now in the process of settlement.

Not only are the representative people of Deerfield and outlying territory members of this association, but it has a larger number of members residing in Chicago and also has the distinction of having members mailing checks each month as far distant as Detroit, Cleveland and New York.

The personnel of the board of directors and officers of this association assures not only a conservative management but also an aggressive policy in making it an important feature for the promotion of thrift and the financing of home owning and home building in Deerfield and adjoining suburbs.

**Huge Total of Fees Collected; Secretary Stratton in Report**

Fees collected by the corporation department of his office will exceed \$4,000,000 in 1930, Secretary of State William J. Stratton announced today.

In the first 10 months of this year the collections of the department aggregated \$3,887,487,486.39 as compared with \$3,394,090.44 collected in the same period of 1928. This is an increase of \$493,395.95 for the 10 months and the increase for the entire year probably will exceed \$500,000.

The report of the corporation department shows that 5132 domestic corporations were licensed to do business in this state in the first 10 months of 1928. This compares with 5521 licensed in the same period of this year, an increase of 389. On the same comparative basis the foreign corporations increased 195.

The collections of this department go into the general revenue fund in the state treasury and reduce the amount that must be raised by direct taxation of property to carry on the business of the state government.

The automobile department of the secretary of state's office, the greatest money raiser of all state departments, will turn approximately \$18,000,000 into the state treasury this year. Inasmuch as the automobile license law provides all of this money shall go into the road fund, the annual collections of this department alone would pay for 600 miles of hard surfaced pavement at a cost of \$30,000 a mile.
