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FINE NEW BUILDING TO OPEN SATURDAY

apartment building in Highland Park so equipped.

The building is of fireproof construction throughout, with a mansard roof which adds greatly to its appearance. The architecture is of the French-Normandy style, and the material is Bedford stone, stucco and concrete, with slate roof, making a very beautiful structure and a notable addition to the business building of the city.

Cork floors are provided throughout in the apartments and corridors, with the exception that the bedrooms are carpeted throughout. The floors in the shops on the first floor are terrazzo. The apartments are provided with wood-burning fireplaces, and the living rooms are finished in French, English or colonial style, making the apartments throughout very attractive, comfortable and homelike. Kitchenette equipment, electric refrigeration and vacuum cleaning facilities are provided. Bathrooms have tile floors and walls and are equipped with showers over the tubs.

W. D. Mann of Highland Park and Chicago is the architect and under his able supervision there has been erected one of the most substantial and attractive buildings of this character on the north shore. Regarding the style of the roof Mr. Mann expressed the opinion that this mansard type was a great improvement over the old flat roof so common to business and apartment structures in many cities, and the artistic value of the style here adopted will be generally appreciated.

Old-Time Magazine Prints Being Used in Decorating Work

Godey's Ladies' Book, one of the earliest fashion magazines in America, long since extinct, after all these years has come to the rescue of those who are puzzled over Christmas gifts, according to Farm & Fireside.

The approaching holiday season has brought an increased demand for prints from the old magazines which show fashionable damsels of past ages. One of the favorite uses of the prints is framing them, but scores of other things are being done with them. Telephone book covers of cardboard, decorated with the Godey prints, are attractive, and any little girl would cherish a hatbox with a prim little print on one side. These boxes are first covered with attractive, plain wallpaper, and ribbons are attached to each side to form handles.

As decorations for waste paper baskets, trinket boxes and magazine holders, the prints are extremely popular as they make inexpensive presents that are nearly always appreciated.

The Godey prints appeared more than seventy years ago and were considered the foremost fashion plates of the day. Recently, largely because of the extreme contrasts in fashions, reprints have come into great demand.

Science Learning New Facts About Breathing; Discard Old Beliefs

Although scientists have mastered numerous other problems in the recent progressive years, they have failed to throw new light upon the basic science of breathing and are just now beginning to realize their neglect, according to Annie L. Macleod, writing in Woman's Home Companion.

"Heretofore," she says, "we Americans have treated our breathable atmosphere as we did our children, kept it warm and dry and trusted it would do its duty. We have acted upon the principle that is taught to every primary school child that 'you breathe in oxygen and breathe out carbon dioxide,' which made the case for carbon dioxide look serious for a time. Now, however, science is turning its attention to ventilation and it has been found that it is almost impossible not to have sufficient oxygen unless one is sealed in a submarine or ascends to new high altitudes in the air."

The late discoveries in the science of breathing, continues the author, disproves the old theory that crowded rooms become so saturated with poisonous carbon dioxide that health is endangered. It has been learned that in country air the carbon dioxide content is .03 per cent, while in a smoky city it rises to only .04 per cent. Even in an exceedingly overcrowded room, the content is not more than .05 per cent. Crews of submarines are ordered to remain submerged until the carbon dioxide rises to 3 per cent and tests made by placing persons in enclosures containing varying degrees of carbon dioxide have shown that 2 per cent had no harmful effects.

The conclusion is that atmosphere fit for breathing is merely a matter of a correct relation between heat and moisture and it is upon this theory that scientists are now basing their study in the hope of correcting one of the most abused conditions of living.

Says 1,000 American Cities Have Airports; Urges Their Necessity

One thousand American cities are now equipped with airports, it was revealed by Col. Harry E. Blee, chief of the airports division of the department of commerce, during a radio talk in Washington, D. C.

"Realizing the advantage of having a gateway to the new commerce which is in the air, 1,100 other cities are organizing committees and otherwise preparing for airports," he said.

"Cities and towns realize they must have suitable airports if they are to have a place in the far-flung air transportation program. Without an adequate airport no city can expect to gain advantages of air travel.

"Air transport, business aviation and commercial aeronautics are here to stay. They have shown their superiority to slower means of transportation. How fully it will serve each city depends on the city itself.

"The central government is helping. Through the department of commerce, the government is developing an extensive system of national airways over which commercial, military and private planes may operate with complete safety. The smaller units of government should assist in every way possible to keep America at the head of aeronautical development in the world."

Members of Antioch fire department have completed a survey of the extensive series of buildings on the Chris Paschen farm, northeast of the village limits with the object of determining the best method of fighting the flames in the event that a fire occur in the series of extensive structures on his farm. The farm which contains more than 800 acres and is equipped with many large buildings is known as "Paschendale." The farm is equipped with a 10,000

gallon reserve water supply tank to be used only in case of fire. Besides other live stock there are 100 head of thoroughbred jersey cows and 3,000 white leghorn chickens on the farm.
