A proposition for use of brick in resurfacing Illinois' hard roads is under consideration by Governor Louis I. Emerson following a plea in behalf of the coal and brick manufacturing interests of the state made last evening by industrial representatives from many cities. The governor indicated that the opinion of the highway department would be asked in the matter.

Brick, the conferees contend, is more durable than cement and while more costly at the start does not cause as much maintenance cost as concrete.

IDENTIFY MAN HERE AS FORMER CONVICT

Frank Willis, in Hospital, Is Believed One of Lake Villa Bandits

Identification of Fred Willis, wounded freight car thief, as John Reed, convict of three state penitentiaries, was completed late last week at the Highland Park hospital by railroad detectives, according to Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle.

A. W. Mulholland, special agent for the St. Paul railway, identified Willis, according to the sheriff. Mulholland came to Waukegan for a talk with Doolittle, when he was advised by the sheriff that there had been a shooting in the Soo Line yards at Lake Villa in which one freight car thief was killed and another wounded. Mulholland declared that his road had suffered from losses by thievery and he went to Highland Park where he identified Willis as the convict, Reed, the sheriff reported.

Knows Slain Man

Mulholland stated that he knew the unidentified dead man and that he was a St. Louis gunman. The sheriff, who was up all night before investigating the shooting, failed to remember the name of the dead gangster due to his fatigue.

Reed, according to the sheriff, was convicted in Wisconsin for the slaying of William Fairweather, a railroad detective from Burlington 12 years ago, and served terms in Joliet and the state penitentiary in Michigan.

Reed, two years ago, advised Elmer Green, then warden at Joliet, that a gunman disguised as a priest would enter the prison with dynamite under his clothing to liberate the Chenoa bank robbers. The masquerader was trapped and thus Reed, the prison informer, was granted his freedom.

Begs for Mercy

"Hello, Reed, remember Bill Fairweather?" was Mulholland's greeting as he entered the hospital room. Reed failed to reply.

"I thought you said you would go straight. I'll come back when you find your tongue and loosen up a little," Mulholland declared.

"Listen, Mac, give me a break." Reed pleaded as the railroad detective started to leave the room.

"I'll be back at 11 o'clock tomorrow and listen to you talk a little," Mulholland said as he continued out of the room.

Treble the Guard

Sheriff Doolittle immediately sent two more deputies, William Klarkowski and Carl Malmquist, to the hospital where John De Smidt had been standing guard. Chief of Police Edward Moroney also instructed his patrolmen to watch the hospital grounds closely.

A. W. DeGross, special agent on the Soo Line, single handed fought the pair in the yards at Lake Villa when he caught them opening box cars. The railroad has paid out between \$18,000 and \$20,000 in claims since September.

States Attorney Smith issued a warrant charging Reed with larceny.

Putting on Hat Now Is High Art Gesture, Says Magazine Writer

The simple process of putting on a hat has become a high art in the era of present styles, according to Jane Warren Wells in Farm & Fireside.

"Hats are back," she says, "two inches or more. They flew backward in amazement at the startling changes in fashion. At least that is the way they look. Instead of wearing our hats down so that only one eye is visible, now not only both eyes must be seen, but a goodly portion of the forehead as well.

"Your hat must be pulled well down on the neck in the back and up at the front. It is really a flattering fashion, especially if you coo some important little locks out at the sides.

"Always pull your hat on from the back and see that it is perfectly straight on the head. This year so many of the hats have a pronounced side-line that you have to be careful to see that the center front of the hat comes exactly in line with the eyes. If your hair is long and a becoming hat is hard to find, try thinning out the hair in the back, leaving just enough to tuck the ends in a modest French knot. It takes a great deal of courage to do this, but it will be much easier afterward to find more becoming hats as well as more comfortable ones. Don't be afraid to make a change in your type of hat, because it is just as necessary as a change in dress or color."
