"Evolution: A Witness to God," and of another vocation "What Is My Life Work?", as well as "The Colors of the Republic," written in 1915, Dr. Stewart has gained a wide reputation. His latest book is "Spanish Summer" and next Spring he hopes to publish "Six Alters."

Genevieve Forbes Herrick of the Chicago describes him as,—"Mystic man of affairs. A self reliant Scotchman loving metaphysics and theology, preaching soberness and dignity; and a romantic Irishman enjoying sentiment, humor, argument and fairies. A seer, who comes down from his ivory tower to card index his library or manage to the smallest detail a financial campaign."

Amazing Versatility

One of his curates writes: "Perhaps the most interesting thing about Dr. George Craig Stewart is his amazing versatility. No matter what he turns his mind to, whether it be the theories of Einstein or the latest book on philosophy of religion, or Gothic architecture, or the financing of a building project he does it not only well but interestingly. As rector of St. Luke's parish he has built up a devoted congregation. In the same time he has built his own monument in a magnificent Gothic church which bears the deep impress of his personality. His work among the college men and women has been effective in keeping them awake to the essentially spiritual constitution of the universe and to the fallacy of the mechanistic and deterministic theories so popular in some circles. His voice is influential in the highest councils of the Episcopal church and in 1928 he was one of the delegates at the Lausanne Conference. Bank director, hard working alumnus and trustee of Northwestern university, enthusiastic golfer, civic leader, — one looks and marvels and thanks God that Dr. Stewart has devoted his abilities to the Kingdom of Heaven and not to the amassing of a private fortune."

The evening spent with Dr. Stewart should prove most delightful and Ossoli feels very fortunate in securing so successful a speaker for her members and guests.
