

### Holy Cross Church Celebrates Anniversary

In the presence of an overflow crowd of parishioners past and present, November 10, at 11 a. m., Monsignor Thomas F. Quinn sang a solemn mass of thanksgiving, assisted by the Rev. John I. Gallery of St. Patrick's church, South Chicago, as deacon, and the Rev. John B. Scanlan of Our Lady of Solace church sub-deacon. The Rev. Charles L. McDonough, present pastor of the Deerfield church, assisted as master of ceremonies. The Rev. J. K. Fielding of St. Patrick's church, Everett, was present in the sanctuary.

The music was rendered by a double quartet from St. Mary's of the Lake seminary, Mundelein, Ill., with Professor Singenberger at the organ. They sang the Mass of the Dedication of a Church.

For the past four months since the appointment of Father McDonough as pastor the church has been remodeled. A new basement with ade-

quate kitchen facilities and a place for card parties, accommodating 50 tables, and dances has been installed. A new oil heating plant has been put in and the church upstairs was remodeled and redecorated. These new improvements, beautifying the church, have just been completed and it was indeed appropriate that the finishing of the work should be at the time the recommendation of the anniversary took place.

Too much praise cannot be given to the Catholic people of Deerfield who have rendered both their financial and moral support to the improvements now completed. Their generosity and loyalty speak well for the future of the parish.

#### Public Health Nursing

Public health nursing was first begun under the auspices of the church. The sick poor were visited in their homes by nurses, either nuns or religious workers, and given nursing attention.

In time, visiting nurses, other than these religious workers, were engaged by private organizations, and it is from these two sources that our present system of public health nursing was evolved.

Medical science, however, has pointed to the fact that much illness could be prevented by education pertaining to the laws governing contagion and along hygienic lines and a new group of workers were introduced demonstrating the second great principle of public health nursing, namely, the prevention of illness.

As far back as the middle of the last century, medical inspection in schools was begun in France, followed shortly by other countries. It was soon found that medical inspection without the necessary follow-up work was of little benefit.

In about the year 1900 a visiting nurse in London was loaned to the public schools to demonstrate the value of the nurse in the school. This proved so satisfactory that, the following year, a staff of school nurses was appointed for the work.

The pioneer work of the public health nursing movement in this country was begun in New York City in 1902. This experiment resulted a year later in the appointment of a staff of school nurses.

Today the school nurse is as much a part of the school as the music teacher, the art teacher and the manual training teacher.

### W. W. McIlvaine to Be Cashier of New Bank

The Citizens State bank of Deerfield is fortunate in acquiring the services of W. W. McIlvaine of Chicago as cashier. Mr. McIlvaine was born and raised in Geneseo, Illinois and has therefore a complete bank knowledge coupled with a valuable background of the needs and customs of the smaller city. Until she arrives Dr. W. B. Metcalf will continue to do the inspection work of school children.

Miss Borneman's home is in Sioux Falls, S. D., and she received her training at the Wesley Memorial hospital, Chicago, which is affiliated with Northwestern university. Her general training also included student affiliation with Chicago Visiting Nurses association for two months, six weeks in the social service department of the hospital and three months in the dispensary and outpatient department of Northwestern university mid-school.

She has been employed as surgical nurse at Highland Park hospital since graduation.
