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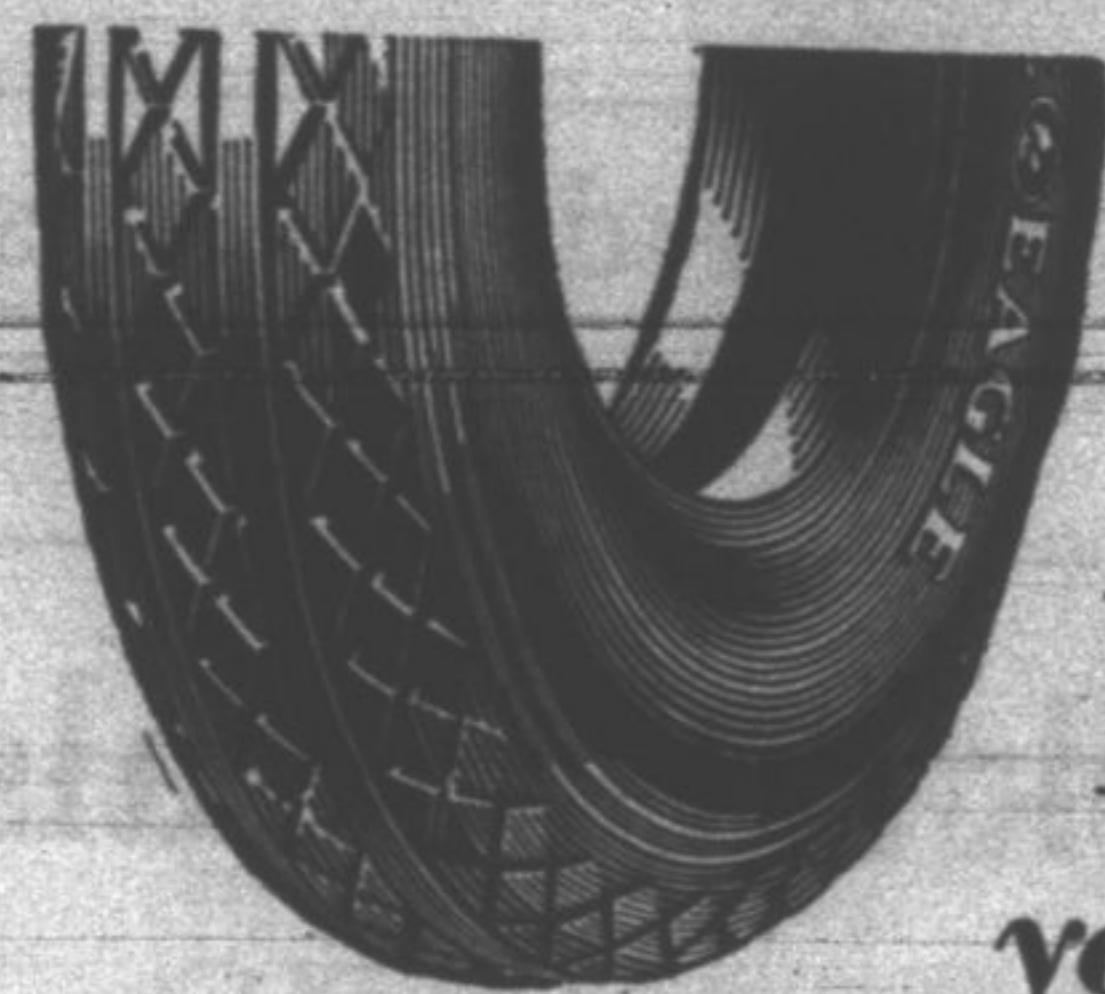

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were very different from those of today in the matter of discipline. A present day student dropped into a school of twenty years ago would be horrified by the noise, confusion, and general disorder. He would not recognize the atmosphere of "school" at all.

Evidently, then, the youth of today is better than the past generation at least so far as school is concerned. What has brought about this change? It is a result of a great change in the purpose and method of education. The schools of yesterday did not educate for leisure or for citizenship. Facts were crammed down the throats of young people. The teacher's slogan was "Do this because I tell you to!" and youth naturally rebelled.

This rebellion has made itself felt in society. The attitude of rebellion against law and order is of the older generation.
