## "Little Women" Given at Evanston Theatre

Recurrent memories of childhood and adolescence, delightful, yet wistful, are called to mind once more as Meg, Joe, Beth and Amy, interpreted by members of the Lake Shore Production Players, come very much to life on the stage of the New Evanston theater.

The play brings smiles and tears as the "Little Women" make real the old story so dear to the hearts of children, old and young. Peggy Fitch is refreshingly tomboyish as Jo. Martha Townsend proves a wistful Beth. The quaint lady-like Meg is ably portrayed by Fiorenza daVeiga and Amy, the coquettish baby of the family brings many laughs with her maive speeches, reminiscent of Mrs. Malaprop, through the personality of Fay Warren.
