Church at Highwood Celebrating With Rededication; Pro- gram in Detail

Rev. Gustav Erickson, pastor of the Swedish Methodist church of Jamestown, New York, is the chief speaker at the Twenty-fifth Anniversary and rededication services now being held at the Highwood Swedish Methodist church. Rev. Mr. Erickson, one of the leading preachers in Swedish Methodism today, was pastor of the local church twenty-five years ago, when the building was first dedicated.
