Loud, representing the Ramabai Mukti Mission, will speak on "India's Mistreated Widows and Abandoned Infant Girls," at the First United Evangelical church, Green Bay road and Laurel avenue, at 7:45 o'clock. Thousands of women and girls have been befriended and educated and sent out as Christian workers in India through this mission. The various institutions built under the direction of Randita Ramabai, a convert to Christianity, fare similar to the Bristol orphanages, established by George Muller. The young people will find Miss Loud's address both interesting and educational. There is no line of thought that is more broadening and enlightening than that which centers in the great missionary enterprise. Old and young are invited to hear Miss Loud.

### Dr. Walter B. Metcalf



Dr. Walter B. Metcalf has been appointed chairman of the reading program committee of the North Shore Area council of the Boy Scouts of America, according to an announcement of Karl D. King, president of the council.

Dr. Metcalf moved to Deerfield from Evanston, seven years ago. Feeling very keenly the lack of library facilities for himself and family, he was instrumental in having a survey made of the reading program among the school children. This survey showed a great need existed. Others were interested by Dr. and Mrs. Metcalf with the result that a library was started. Plans were worked out later whereby it was housed in the public school building.

Last year a referendum election was held and the proposition was carried to make it a township proposition with a tax levy for its support.

Last month alone more than one thousand books were in circulation in addition to its use as a reference library by the public school pupils.

Dr. Metcalf and his committee will develop a reading program to be recommended to the 1200 scouts of the North Shore Area council. A new merit badge in reading has just been instituted by the national organization of the Boy Scouts.

The North shore council had 47 men in attendance; Chicago council had the next largest group. Scouters from the four states, of region No. 7, Michigan, Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois, gathered to develop plans for the next year, to exchange ideas, to discuss problems, and to receive training in doing a better job for the cause of boyhood. These men represented 106 councils and over 90,000 scouts.
