

Schedule of Mailing for Christmas Gifts Issued by Postmaster

Postmaster Hugo Schneider urges everybody to mail their Christmas packages early as there will be no mail delivery anywhere on Christmas day this year. Mail packages to reach their destinations not later than Monday, Dec. 23, is his advice.

Follow schedule shown below to secure best handling, although parcels may be mailed to any address on any date:

Pacific coast states—Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Idaho—December 15 to 17.

Western states—Montana, Wyoming, Utah—December 16 to 18.

Southern states—Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina—December 17 to 20.

Southwestern states—Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas—December 16 to 18.

Northwestern states—North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado—December 17 to 20.

Eastern states—New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, New England states—December 17 to 20.

Neighboring states—Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky—December 19 to 21.

True Bill Against Car Bandit; Grand Jury Acts

Indictments involving fifteen defendants were returned by the December grand jury yesterday after a session that lasted several hours longer than was expected.

Arthur Reid, the Soo Line boxcar bandit was named in true bills charging burglary and larceny of a boxcar on the Soo line near Lake Villa. His indictment was easily the most important of an unexciting roster of cases.

Bonds totaling \$120,000 will be asked in the case of Reid when he is arraigned Monday. The ex-convict was wounded while attempting to enter freight cars in the Lake Villa yards, and he was arrested in Highland Park, after having been brought from Deerfield for treatment in the local hospital.

States Attorney A. V. Smith declared that a bond of \$20,000 would be asked on each indictment of which six were returned.

"Smokey" the Clown Speaks to Children

Harry K. Rogers, at one time fire chief, known to millions of children all over the United States, as Smokey the Clown, spoke to the first six grades of the Elm Place school Wednesday, on how to protect themselves and their homes against fire. A representative of the Highland Park Fire Department was present and assisted him.

"Smokey" is connected with the Western Acturical bureau of Chicago. He represents all of the large fire

insurance companies of America. About one thousand children owe their lives to "Smokey."

Mr. Rogers was brought here under the auspices of the North Shore Real Estate board. He appeared in Northbrook and Deerfield yesterday morning and in Wilmette this morning.
