ILLINOIS NOW HAS NOTABLE ROADWAYS

Eleven Highways North and
South and Six East and
West; in Other States

That comprehensive highway plan-
ning is getting some place is evi-
denced by the number of through
paved routes the national highway
map now reveals.

Most of the through concrete pave-
ments are in the middle west, al-
though there are many lengthy
stretches in all other sections. In
the east, replacement of wornout sur-
faces built with the limited experi-
ence of several years ago, is going on
slowly but surely.

The most notable all-paved eastern
road extends from New York City,
through Philadelphia, Baltimore,
Washington, Richmond, and on to
Raleigh. Another concrete highway
extends from Philadelphia through
the northern part of Pennsylvania to
Erie.

Chicago Is Center

In the middle west several lengthy
pavements radiate from Chicago.
Motorists may travel from Chicago
to Louisville, via Indianapolis, with-
out leaving concrete. All but one
short bit of the highway connecting
Chicago also has paved motorways to
Detroit and to Toledo.

What co-operation between state
highway departments can do is il-
lustrated by the continuous strip of
concrete extending from Hibbing,
Minnesota to Topeka, Kans. This
roadway, also linking Duluth, St.
Paul, Chicago, St. Louis and Kansas
City, is of tremendous economic and
social importance.

Another highway accomplishment
worthy of note is the concrete road
that extends itself practically all the
way round Lake Michigan.

What the state of the future will
provide its motorists is indicated by
Illinois. That state now has 11 pave-
ments from north to south and six
crossing the state east to west.

Out on the Pacific coast one may
travel almost entirely on first class
pavement from Vancouver, B. C., to
Tijuana, Mexico.

Arrest Two in Theatre Bombing in Barrington

Frank Sticking, secretary of the
Elgin Movie Operators' union, and F.
A. McBreien, a business agent of the
union, were arrested last week by
Deputy Sheriff Edward Dunne and
Constable George Stried on a charge
of conspiracy to damage the Catlow
theater in Barrington which was
bombed Nov. 23.

States Attorney A. V. Smith caused
the issuance of the warrants after
Wright Catlow, owner of the build-
ing, made the complaint.

Catlow charged that the two un-
ion men made threats to him when
he refused to employ union opera-
tors. He declared that he did not ob-
ject to his employes joining the un-
ion, however.

Sticking and McBreien were re-
leased on \$5,000 bonds by Justice
Harold Tallett of North Chicago who
set their hearings for Dec. 5.

The damage to the building
amounted to close to \$600.
