

Deport Man Who Slew Comrade 4 Years Ago in Libertyville Scrap

Dominic Enrico, 44, who was sentenced to Joliet from here four years ago after slaying his room mate, Joseph Sobek, 32, in their home in Libertyville, was sent out last week with forty other convicts and undesirable aliens from Chicago to their native countries. Enrico was deported to Italy.

The slaying in Libertyville was as brutal as any committed in the county for years. During a drunken brawl when the men were arguing over who would pay for a gallon of wine Enrico gashed Sobek's head in with an axe.

The killing took place on the evening of November 10, 1924. In the first place a plea of not guilty had been entered to the charge of murder. When States Attorney A. V. Smith agreed to accept a plea of guilty to manslaughter Enrico changed his mind then and admitted his guilt.

Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards sentenced Enrico to one year to life but the Italian failed to get out with the minimum sentence.

November Warm Despite Chilly Close, Report

While the last two days in November were the coldest on record for this month in this section of the country, the month on the average was somewhat warmer than is usual for this period, according to John O. Laux, local government weather observer.


The average temperature for the month was 36 degrees according to the report made public today by Mr. Laux. The highest temperature was 63 degrees recorded on the first of the month and the lowest 4 below zero recorded on the 29th. This compares with 40 degrees as the average recorded in November of last year and with 68 degrees as the highest and 17 degrees as the lowest temperature recording during that period.

Snowfall during the month totalled 1 inch as compared to 1.2 inches of the same month last year.

There were 12 clear days, 9 partly cloudy and 9 cloudy days during the month.

The prevailing winds during the month were southwest.
