Chicago Center of Air Mail Activity; Figures Show Gains

Chicago's air mail and passenger aviation activities have reached a stage where regular operating lines, with terminals in the city, are flying 25,780 miles daily, according to a statement by the Aviation department of the Chicago Association of Commerce.

Despite the need for expansion, the Illinois airport, rated today as the busiest in the world, is operating this year at an efficiency of better than 95 per cent, the association reports.

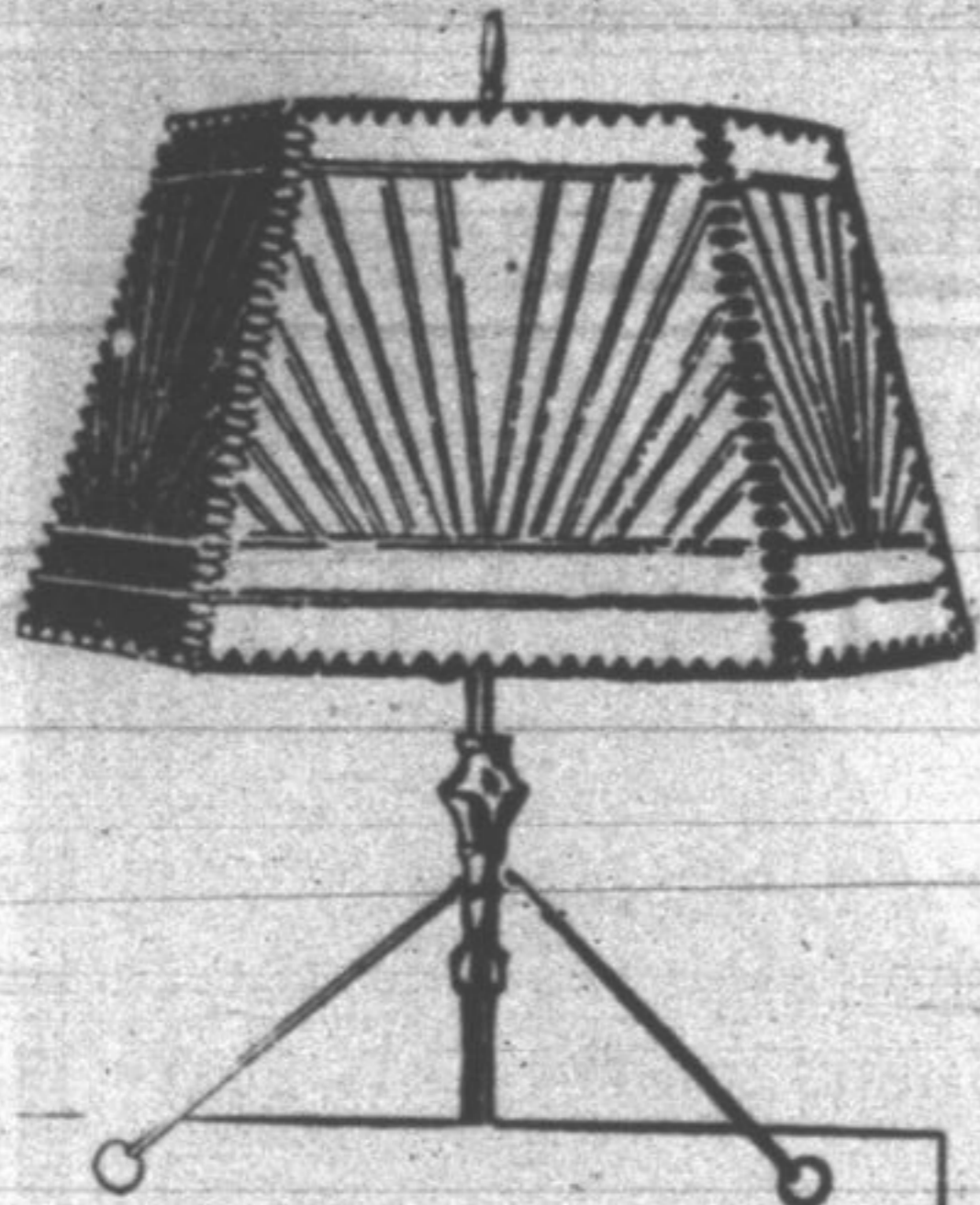
More air mail is cleared through Chicago than any other city in the world, with eight air mail lines having their headquarters and hangars here. In addition, there are four passenger transport systems, transcontinental in scope, operating jointly with the leading railroads.

In line with the campaign started last month by the Association of Commerce to encourage more extended airplane manufacturing activity in Chicago, studies show that the six factories now operating in the city will produce 60 planes during 1929. Several new concerns are being started to produce airplane accessories.

Waukegan Installs No-Left-Turn Signs

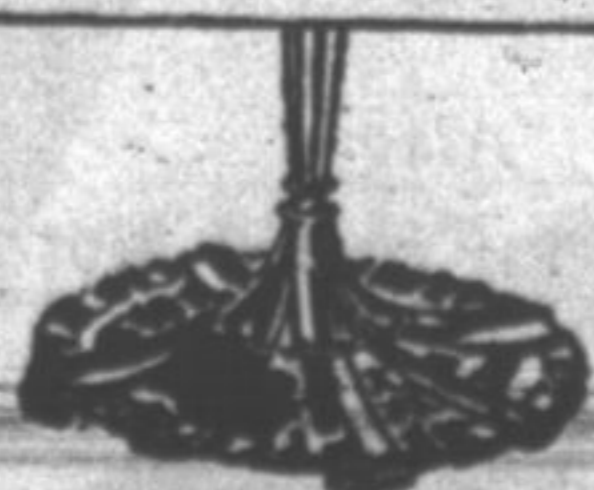
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
