Submit Two Reports Regarding Health Conditions in Deerfield

Following are two reports from the Deerfield board of health:

December 2, 1929
 To the President and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield.

Gentlemen:
 I beg to submit the following report:

All of the children attending school in District No. 109 have been inspected three times each week.

A number of the children have been sent home, because of evidence of either coming down with, or having scarlet fever.

One room with a high percentage of scarlet fever last year and this year has been thoroughly disinfected.

A thorough inspection of the plumbing has been recommended.

With the assistance of the nurse we will soon have this work organized.

Only one inspection has been made at the Wilmot school, but we will be ready to start work in this school within a few days.

Report of the Department of Health for the month of November, 1929

Contagious disease — There were seven (7) cases of scarlet fever, one case of scarlet fever and diphtheria combined and one case of chicken pox reported during the month. Of the scarlet fever cases, four were attending school and three were of the pre-school age.

Inspection—Two inspections were made of the milk supply to the village. In one case, that of a farmer, all members of the family and those handling the milk were examined and found free from any evidence of contagious disease. There was no history of any sore throats or illness of the drivers of the wagons distributing milk.

Nine families were visited following reports of sickness where there were children in the school without finding any evidence of contagious disease.

On November 20, 1929, Dr. Deering from the state department of public health made a survey of the contagious disease situation of the village. After visiting all the homes and examining the children who were ill with and recovering from scarlet fever; inquiring into the quarantine regulations, milk supply, etc. He stated that Deerfield's problem was the problem of many communities through the state and was not unusual at this time of the year.

Recommendation—With medical inspection of all school children; the services of a full time school nurse; the coming of cold weather and snow, I believe there will be a lessening in the number of cases of not only scarlet fever, but all contagious diseases common at this time of the year.

Railroad Estimate of Land Values in County

The average estimated true value per acre of land in Lake county as of April 1, 1929, is placed at \$291 by R. A. Miller, tax commissioner of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway company, who has just completed a report on the land values of all the counties through which the railroad owns trackage.

The survey, which covers the period from January, 1923, to September, 1929, establishes the fact that 19,965

acres of land were sold during that period, at an average sale price of \$247.53 per acre. The total number of transactions recorded was 247. The average assessed full value per acre for the year 1928 was \$94.75.

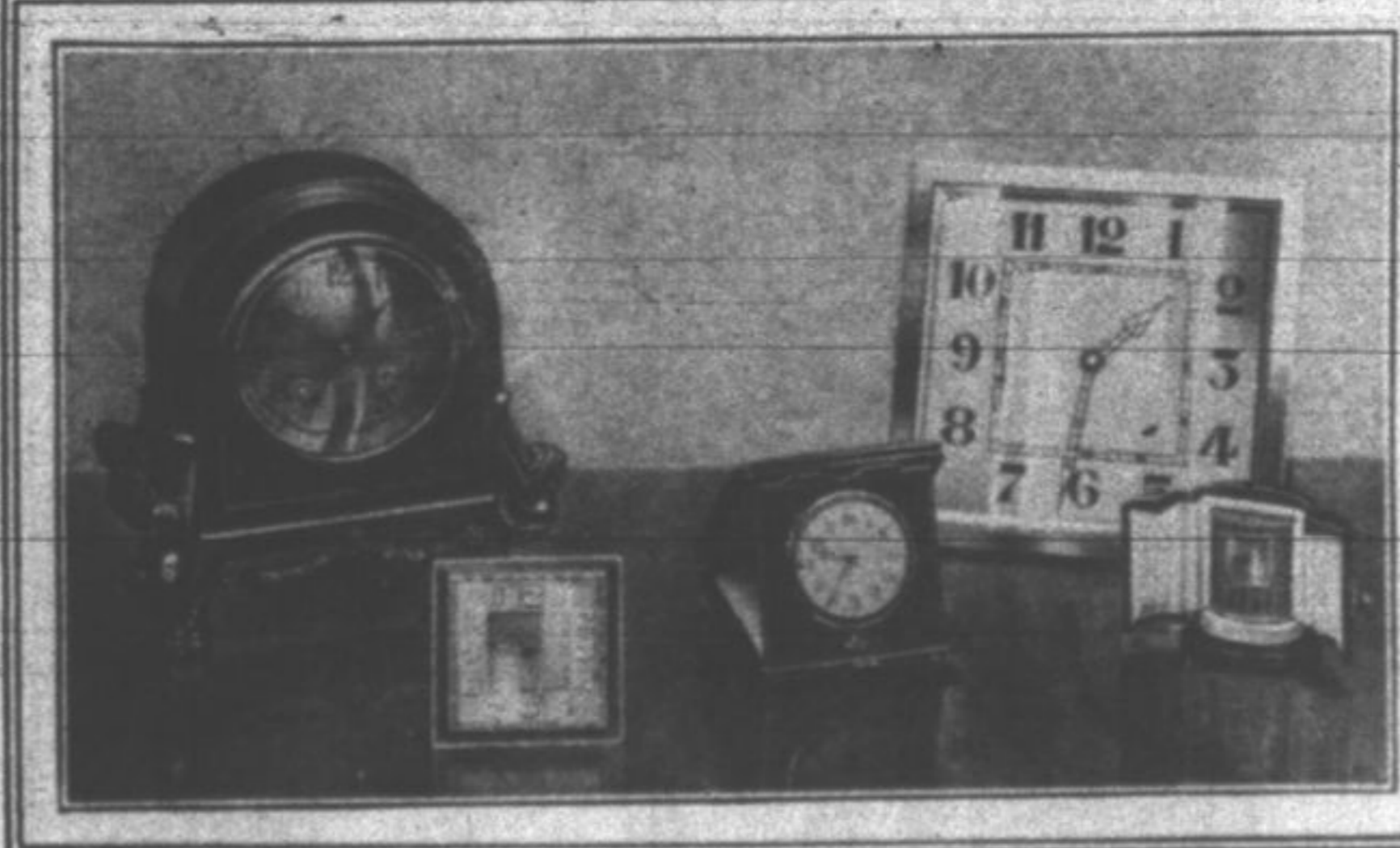
