Arrest Cattle Buyer on Charge of Giving Out Worthless Checks

J. B. Anderson, 40, a cattle buyer who has been purchasing stock in the county for a number of years, was arrested last week at the Fred Grabbe home, 204 Fulton avenue, Waukegan, by Deputy Sheriff Charles Krueger on a charge of issuing worthless checks, says the Waukegan Sun, which continues.

The aggregate of the checks issued and known to the sheriff reach \$1,976.

Anderson was sought for two weeks. Deputy Sheriff Edward Dunne made several trips to Crystal Lake, Cary, Barrington, and into McHenry county towns in search of the man. Each time he was eluded as he knew he was being hunted.

For several days Sheriff Doolittle knew that he was in Waukegan. The information that he might be at the Grabbe home as a guest came late yesterday afternoon and Deputy Krueger watched the place until An-

derson made his appearance.

The three warrants were signed by John Hart, of Round Lake, who accepted a check for \$528; William Moldor of Round Lake, who took a check for \$148; and Tony Jensen of Cary, who carries a check for \$1,300, according to the sheriff.

Government to Improve Waukegan Harbor Soon

Replenishment of the English ring-neck pheasants, which suffered a decided thinning in their ranks during the six day hunting season which closed Nov. 15, was started through the county last week by the state department of conservation.

Ralph F. Bradford, head of the department, authorized planting the northern tier of Illinois counties with 3,500 pairs of birds.

Each pair is expected to raise a brood of ten pheasant chicks next spring and summer. In addition to this 40,000 eggs are to be distributed to farmers so that settings can be placed under hens and released.

More birds will be released later, it is believed.

John Haberkorn, superintendent of game farms, and Edward I. Lundborg, assistant to Mr. Bradford, left Chicago last week to plant the game birds through the rural territory.
