Claims for Bonus Must Be Filed by Dec. 31st

The following regarding Federal Bonus claims time limit is from the Illinois American Legion Bulletin and is commended to the attention of exservice men:

The State Service office is issuing a final warning to all ex-service men and relatives of deceased ex-service men that their claims for Federal Adjusted Compensation (Federal Bonus) must be filed before midnight on December 31, 1929.

It is not expected that this final date will be extended again by Congress.

The Service office is also cautioning and warning all holders of the Adjusted Service certificates that changes in the beneficiaries should be de prompery, wherever there is reason for the change. Proper forms for this can be secured through the State Service department or from the U. S. Veterans' bureau direct. In cases of emergency, changes should be made over the veteran's signature on a blank sheet of paper, and notarized. Unless the change is made, the bureau will pay to the person appearing on record as the deceased bene-
