SUPREME COURT TERM STARTS; MANY CASES

One Triple Death Case; Several for Rehearing, Including Pueschell Case

A variety of interesting cases await the attention of the Illinois supreme court at its December term which opened Tuesday, December 3. The term will close about December 20.

A triple death case is to come before the court December 14. Three men—LaFon Fisher, Leonard Shadow and Leon Brown—are under sentence to die in the electric chair in Cook county for the murder of a bank guard during a holdup. The case will be argued orally on the fourteenth and the court then will take the case under advisement. Set for argument the same day are 17 cases in which the Chicago bar seeks disbarment of as many attorneys for alleged unprofessional conduct.

A number of petitions for rehearings in matters already decided by the court are before the tribunal. Among these is the 1927 gasoline tax test law in which the court held in October that January, 1928, collections belong to the state. On the advisement docket are cases involving collections for the last five months of 1927.

Puschell Case Up

The case of Odo Puschell, convicted in Lake county for the murder of a policeman, also is on the hearing docket.

Also before the court will be a case involving dog race tracks. The Hawthorne Kennel club of Cicero filed the proceedings against State's Attorney John A. Swanson of Cook county. The club is appealing from the decision of the Cook court dismissing its bill for an injunction to restrain Swanson and other officials from interfering with the operation of the track.

A large number of cases, in which decisions may be handed down upon term adjournment, rest on the advisement docket. Among these are: the case involving validity of Litchfields liquor law; the appeal of Melvin Fudge convicted in Christian county

of perjury; the manslaughter case against Dr. Amante Rongetti and the contempt of court case against his attorney, William Scott Stewart; the last reapportionment suit filed by the late Colonel Fergus; and the case against the Stock Yards bank of Chicago, involving alleged practice of law by banks in the state.

Highwood Loses Close Game to Y. M. Club of Lake Forest Nov. 28th.

The Lake Forest Young Men's club defeated the Highwood team in their annual battle at Farwell field, Lake Forest, Thanksgiving day by the narrow margin of one point. The final score was 7 to 6.

Highwood lost the game in the second quarter following a fumble on the 15 yard line which was recovered by a Gold Coast player. Watt finally took the ball across from the two yard line on an off guard slant.
