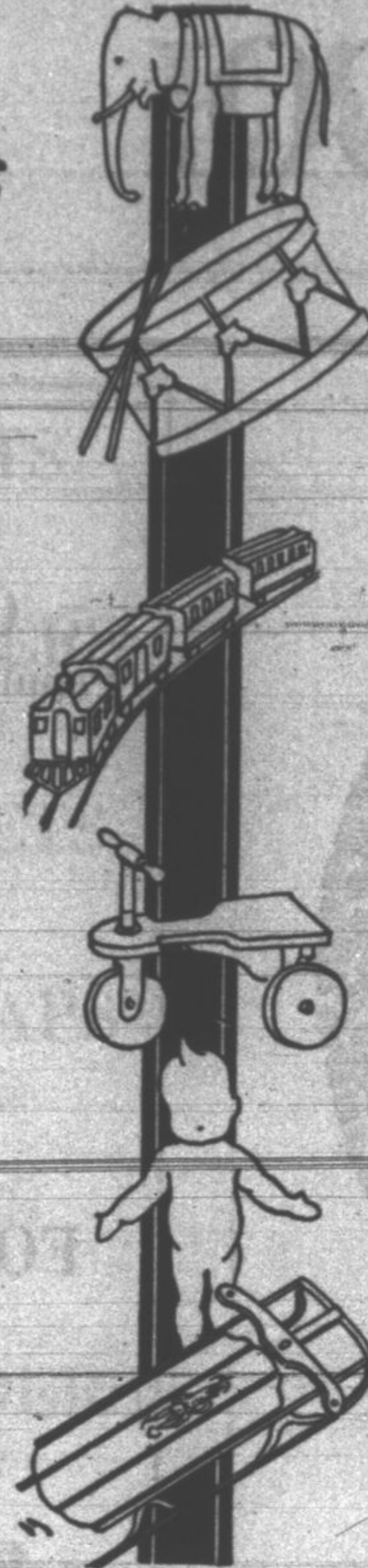

FIND PREHISTORIC BEAVER'S SKELETON

Discovery in Indiana of Animal
as Large as Bear; Field
Museum Hast It

The tales about John Bunyan, the fabled giant logger, and the immense animals he contended with in his lumbering exploits, might have been more than myths had loggers been cutting down our forests a few thousand years ago. For up until between 6,000 and 8,000 years ago, the prehistoric gigantic ancestors of some of our modern animals still roamed America, and a few may have survived even into historic times, contemporary with early man, according to paleontologists.

Even the small familiar beaver had an ancestor which grew to about the size of a black bear. An almost complete skeleton of such a beaver, and a piece of wood which plainly shows teeth marks identified as those of a prehistoric giant beaver four or five times the size of the modern species, are on exhibition at Field Museum of Natural History.

The skeleton, which includes the lower jaw with its large cutting teeth, was obtained near Fairmount, Indiana. The museum possesses also the jaw of another prehistoric beaver unearthed at Groverton, Indiana. The fossil wood which probably was once part of a dam built by a huge beaver was excavated by a steam shovel crew dredging a peat bog on the shore of Grass Lake, near Antioch, Illinois, and was presented to the museum by Charles N. Ackerman, a member of the institution. Search is now being made by Mr. Ackerman's crew for bones of the animal.

Castoroides, as the prehistoric beaver is named by scientists, was almost identical with the modern beaver in practically every respect except size, according to Prof. Elmer S. Riggs, associate curator of paleontology. These beavers had cutting teeth which grew as much as nine inches in length and were more than five-eighths of an inch in diameter.
