MIDDLE WEST LEADS IN RADIO STATIONS

Distribution of Facilities in the
Several Zones Shows
This Feature

Information on the distribution of radio facilities among the five zones, that will upset the long-held beliefs of the majority of radio fans has been disclosed in a report prepared for the senate to be used in analysis of the Davis equalization amendment to the radio law. This law provides for the equal distribution of radio broadcasting facilities among the five radio zones, based on population.

It is shown that the middle western, or fourth radio zone, is far in advance of the other zones as to number of stations. The fourth zone also surpasses, by substantial amounts, three of the five zones in broadcasting power. The figures, given, comparing the number of broadcasting station licenses and power as of Sept. 20, 1928, to Nov. 20, 1929, were prepared by Commissioner Harold A. Lafount.

Fourth Zone's Rating

They show also the channel assignments to each of the zones. Here are some of the disclosures:

The fourth zone has 155 broadcasting stations, utilizing 325,265 watts of power. On Sept. 20, 1928, or prior to the nation-wide reallocation of broadcasting facilities effected pursuant to the Davis amendment, it had 152 stations using 156,015 watts.

The first, or eastern zone, ranks next to the fourth in point of broadcasting power, with 307,225 watts but has an aggregate of only 111 stations. On Sept. 20, 1928, it had 117 stations, using 194,425 watts.

In East Central Zone

The second, or east central zone, has 104 stations with 226,855 watts, as against 96 stations with 190,680 watts; the third, or southern zone, 117 stations with 188,070 watts as compared to 117 stations with 60,580 watts, and the fifth, or western zone, 127 stations with 107,925 watts as against 124 stations with 67,850 watts.

New York state, with 55 broadcasting stations, leads all other states in point of total stations.

In respect to power Illinois is far in the lead with 213,250 watts.

First International Tunnel Under Detroit River, U. S. to Canada

The world's first international automobile tunnel which is being constructed under the Detroit River from Detroit to Windsor, Ont., is a marvel of engineering and ranks with the famous Holland Tunnel connecting New York City and Jersey and the George A. Posey Tunnel, connecting Oakland and Alameda, Cal.

The Detroit Tunnel has a roadway of 22 feet and an estimated capacity of 1,000 vehicles an hour in either direction, being limited to this number by the formalities of customs regulations.

The tube is 5,135 feet from portal to portal and 5,485 feet from street grade to street grade. It is 45 feet below the channel water level.

In this tunnel, new problems and air purification have been conquered. A fresh air duct extends under the floor section with the foul air duct between the ceiling slab and the roof of the tunnel throughout the greater length. At the outer sections of the tunnel, both fresh and vitiated air are carried in passageways above the roadway, the fresh air being led from its passageways down the sidewalks and released from the tunnel near the roadway level.

In the ventilating building at each end of the tunnel will be 12 giant fans, six of the blower type and six of the exhaust type. The fresh air is pumped into the tunnel and emitted alongside the roadway at about the level of the ordinary automobile exhaust. Suction fans operating through the upper duct draw the foul air in through openings in the ceiling slabs. Approximately one million cubic feet of air will be required a minute under maximum operating conditions and a complete change will be made in 90 seconds.

The power layout is so arranged that any part of the equipment may be operated from either the American or Canadian side, obviating any likelihood of a power breakdown.

FORMER ROYAL GEMS OF RUSSIA DISPLAYED

Glittering Exhibit in London
of Jewels Once Property
of the Czars

Formerly the personal possessions of the late czar and czarina of Russia, 100 articles and gems are on view in a Regent street, London, shop window awaiting a buyer.

Experts declare they are among the most exquisite works of Faberge, the Russian Court jeweler, and other noted workmen, and represent the finest workmanship that Russia and Asia have combined to produce, says an International News report from London.

Prominent among the articles is a cigarette box of moss agate, heavily set with jewels and bearing the arms of imperial Russia. It was found on a chair in the winter palace just after the czarina left the palace shortly to die at the hands of Bolshevik executioners. A number of the czarina's own brand of cigarettes were in the box when it was discovered.

Other treasures offered for sale are the robes worn by the czar and czarina at their coronation; the robes of the Archbishop of St. Petersburg, and a magnificent golden, jewel-studded chalice taken from his cathedral; the blazing order of St. Catherine worn by the czar on state occasions, and many other beautiful objects which cannot be matched anywhere in the world.

Crowds are daily besieging the Regent street store to gaze at the treasures, the true value of which cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.

The partner of the firm which brought the objects to London from Russia told International News Service there still remained in the Hermitage in Moscow royal treasures among which the magnificent specimens now on view here would pale almost into insignificance.

"There are single jewels in the Hermitage," he said, "which no man in the world—however wealthy—could buy. They are priceless."
