Receipts of Gas Tax in U. S. During Last Year Totals Big Sum

Receipts from the gasoline tax throughout the United States in 1920 will total approximately \$400,940,000, or about 30 per cent more than the total in 1928, when \$304,771,776 was collected, according to a bulletin issued by the Chicago Motor club.

The large increase for this year may be attributed to the fact that Massachusetts passed a gas tax law which became effective January 1, 1929; New York also adopted a tax which took effect May 1, and Illinois passed a similar law, effective August 1. Twenty states increased the rate of tax this year, and increased consumption of gasoline is also a factor in the increased collections. Three states now have a tax of six cents per gallon.
