ROGERS SAYS FORD CHAMPION OF CHAMPS

Humorist Declares Henry Takes Not Only Cake But Entire Bake Shop

"Napoleon was the originator of the Gang Leaders. He matched forty wars and finished up as a corporal. Bobby Jones is a champion because he can find a hole in the ground quicker than a prairie dog. Mellow is a champion. He took our treasury when it was nothing but a building. Now it's a vault," declares Will Rogers in The American Magazine, picking the Grand Champion of all time. Then he finally places the laurel of all laurels on the brow of Henry Ford.

Canada Got It "George Washington was a cham-

ion in three or four lines," continues Rogers. "George whipped England to try and get us Freedom; Canada stayed with England and got it. Henry Ford is responsible for more building than any man in the world. There is more money invested in garages than in schools and churches.

"Ninety-eight and one-half per cent of the building permits in small towns are for filling stations. Over two-thirds of the unemployed in this coun-

try are working in filling stations. "There are 300,000 men just pumping gas into cars every minute of the day in America alone. And 193,000 fixing punctures. There are 800,000 just looking on; 750,000 of them offering advice, .009 per cent successful

Ford Fixed It "Edison gave us the electric light. But Ford fixed it so we wouldn't have to stay home at night and use it. He is the first rich man to discover that an old-time fiddler could play just as good as the long haired one with a foreign name and a misfit dress suit. There never was a foreign fiddler yet that could make an audience pat its foot; and there never was an audience that ever heard a country fiddler that could keep from patting it.

"He done more to further aviation than all the other rich men combined. So I enter him as Champion of all Champions.

"Course, if you want a few more statistics and facts, why here they are:

"He has caused more dirty dishes to be left in the sink after supper than all of the leading men in the movies. "He has broke more people's wrists than all the osteopaths in the world combined."

Monkey Pots, Curious Fruit of Trees Which Grow in Tropic Climes

Monkey pots, the curious fruit of a gigantic forest tree of South America, used by natives to capture monkeys alive, are the subject of an exhibit in the department of botany at Field Museum of Natural History.

The monkey pots proper are members of the monkey pot family comprising some 231 species of trees, including the one from which the familiar Brazil nut comes, the nuts being seeds of the tree which occur packed in large pot-like fruits. The fruits of the various trees in this family are woody, hollow and characterized by openings at the top covered with natural removable tops, exactly like many kinds of man-made receptacles.

To trap monkeys, natives of the tropics remove the monkey pot tops, and fill the pots with nuts, according to tropical explorers. The pots are then left where the monkeys will encounter them. The monkeys reach into the opening for the nuts, but when their fist is full it is too large to draw out again through the opening. However, reluctant to let go of their prize, the monkeys hang on, and thus impeded in their escape they are easy to capture.

The museum exhibit includes specimens of several kinds of monkey pots, and also the woody globular fruits of the Brazil nut tree; the sapucaya nut which is also delicious as a food; and a fruiting and flowering branch of the Barringtonia tree of Oceania with its pomegranate-like fruit. Fibers of some of the monkey pots are used in rope making. Other monkey pot fruits are used in the manufacture of medicines, snuff, cigarette papers, and a garment material, soft as linen, which is used by South American Indians.

For Indoor Plants
