

### TWO DIE AS RESULT OF HIGHWAY CRASH

#### Aged Chicago Man and Wife Are Victims of Auto Accident Near Deerfield

John Goebel, 88, and his wife, 86, of 736 N. Laurel avenue, Chicago, are dead, and two others with them suffered injuries when an automobile in which they were riding skidded and crashed against a tree on Waukegan road, just south of Deerfield about 8:15 o'clock on Sunday evening.

Mrs. G. Lawley, daughter of the aged couple, and residing at the same address, suffered the loss of all of her front teeth and was badly cut and bruised, while Mrs. C. Feldman, a daughter of Mrs. Lawley, sustained severe lacerations about the face and throat. Three generations of the family were involved in the accident.

#### Internal Injuries

Both Goebel and his wife suffered internal injuries. The husband died two or three hours after the accident while his wife survived until early Monday morning.

A special dispatch to the Chicago Daily News yesterday says that Julius Rosenwald, one of Chicago's foremost citizens, mail-order magnate and philanthropist, and whose summer home is in Highland Park, was quietly married at 12:30 Wednesday to Mrs. Adelaide Goodkind, mother-in-law of his eldest son, Lessing J. Rosenwald.

The ceremony, a simple affair, was performed in the home of the younger Rosenwald, "The Meadows," in Abington, a suburb of Philadelphia, by Judge Horace Stern of the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas, an old friend of the family.

There were no bridesmaids and no best man and only immediate members of the two families attended.

Barnum can be called the father of modern advertising—he was the first person to bring class music to the United States—he did a great deal toward the development of the theater and of the museum idea—he was one of the first to provide wholesome entertainment both for old and young, and his character and ideal were splendid—in other words, he was a real American, in the best sense of the word.

#### Women on Juries

"At the coming November election, in pursuance to an Act of the last Illinois general assembly, there will be submitted for determination the question, "Shall women serve on Juries?"

In 20 of our states, women are serving on juries. The result has been according to statements made by judges, attorney generals, and the bar of the several states, that the presence of women on juries has materially improved the administration of justice.

Under the 19th Amendment of the Federal Constitution, women are entitled to vote. We find women among our law makers and on the bench. One of the members of the supreme court of Ohio is Florence Allen. Judge
