Duty and Obligation

If jury service may be regarded as a duty and an obligation, which it certainly is, I believe the great majority of the women of Cook county, and the great State of Illinois will cheerfully assume such obligation in the discharge of their civic duties. It is sometimes urged that certain cases in our court involving social cause should not be heard by women. There is every reason, however, why our women should aid in solving our social problems. It is also urged as against women serving on juries, the impracticability of keeping a mixed jury together in criminal cases. The law provides for separate quarters for women jurors, with provision for women bailiffs.

The adoption of this law by the people will be a forward step. It will undoubtedly, in my opinion, improve the administration of justice. Women now can sue and be sued. They frequently appear in court as witnesses. The adoption of this law will give them the right in such instances to have some members of their own sex on a jury.

...that women, politically, or in the exercise of any attribute of citizenship, are subordinate to men? Fairness, justice, and the experience of other states of our country should assure that this proposition be adopted by the people."

CITY GETS BIDS ON SHORE PROTECTION

The report of the building department for the month of December, 1929 was ordered placed on file, it is summarized elsewhere in this issue.

Estimate No. 9 in favor of the Priester Construction company, contractors, for Division "A" of the improvements to the Highland Park Water Works in the amount of \$13,349 was approved and a voucher ordered issued in payment of same.

Mayor Lewis announced that the time having arrived for the opening of bids for the construction of shore protection for the Highland Park Press of December 19, 1929 and December 26, 1929, that bids would now be opened. The bids were then opened as above reported.

Victor S. Pearlman & company were awarded the contract for the furnishing of electric lighting fixtures for the new City Hall in accordance with their bid submitted therefor, with the understanding that a reduction of \$130 be made for the elimination of two lights in the court room. The bid was \$2,393.

The Floor-It Company, Inc., was awarded the contract for the laying of certain flooring in connection with the new City Hall building in accordance with their bid submitted therefor. The bid specifies marbelette and was \$850.

Receiving and opening of bids on the present City Hall property was postponed until Monday, Jan. 20, 1929 at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

A committee from the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce interviewed the council regarding traffic lighting and urged other light signals installed on the east side of Green Bay at the Vine avenue intersection and also for lights at Central and St. Johns avenues. The committee was composed of Lewis Sinclair, Lester Stanger and Fred Gieser.
