Are You a Member?

Are you a member of the only "club" in Highland Park from which no annual dues are required, yet it has a cosy and attractive club house whose chief handicap is attempting to serve a city of 14,000 although it was built for a city of 5,000. This "club" is administered by a group of nine trustees who meet regularly on the second Thursday of each month and give many extra hours of valuable time without one cent of compensation.

This club though usually not so-called, is your public library which is supported by the tax payers of the city. It is free and open every day of the week from 9 to 9, except Sunday, to all residents of Highland Park and all those employed in the city.

Nine hundred and seventy-five new members availed themselves of the privilege of free books and magazines in 1929. These together with the old members number about 5,000 borrowers who have a membership card and are making active use of it. 80,077 books were borrowed for home use in 1929, of which only 20,289 were borrowed by the children.
