Miss Comer in Cast

Miss Zoe Comer of Highland Park is cast as Kitty, the wife of Captain Baldry. Miss Comer is known in Highland Park through her directorship of the dramatics of the Deerfield-Shields township high school, as well as for her past work with the Circuit theater. The part of Kitty, the wife who is not recognized by her husband, who must watch him as he enjoys the company of those whom he knew fifteen years before without being included in the companionship, is a most difficult one to portray and will require studied and consistent acting from Miss Comer.

As Captain Christopher Baldry will appear McPherson Holt of Lake Forest. Mrs. Richard Bentley of Lake Forest will play the part of Margaret Grey, a very dear friend of Captain Baldry's in the days to which his mind has returned. Mrs. Bentley has played several times with the North Shore Theater guild productions of the past, notably in "Autumn Fire" and in "Ariadne" but this will be

the first part played by Mr. Holt with the organization. He is an amateur of some ability, however, and his portrayal of the role will be a very important phase of the production.

Glencoe will supply two of its Threshold players group to this cast of the Circuit Theater association. Mrs. T. E. Schulte, Jr. is cast as Jenny, a cousin of the captain's and Joseph K. Shippen will play Dr. Frank Baldry, an army surgeon and also a cousin, who is among those who are attempting to effect a return to the normal for the young captain. Mrs. Schulte will make her Circuit theater debut with this play, but Mr. Shippen is a veteran with the organization, last appearing in the leading role of "Lilies of the Field" last May.

Hynes of Evanston will complete the cast, playing the part of Dr. Gilbert Anderson, an expert in amnesia cases, who is endeavoring, as are all the rest, to find the way to restore the memory of the soldier. "The Return of the Soldier" enjoyed a good season of production in London, but has not, to knowledge, been presented for the public in America. naming a candidate. The first business is the election by the legislature of the speaker. The speaker names all committees. There are now six women and one hundred forty-seven men who are members of the legislature. It is possible to consider three hundred bills during a session.

Each Tuesday on each member's desk, a copy of the Digest appears with a resume of every bill introduced. A copy of the minutes of the previous meeting also appears in which is the roll call on votes on bills. The calendar appears daily.

Order of Day's Program

The following gives the order of the day for the legislature. First, the roll call; then, the roll call for presentation of bills. The speaker reads it by title only and refers it to a committee. Then bills on first reading are referred to committee for report. No discussion on floor is permitted at the first reading. Next, bills on second reading are read. These may be amended from the floor at this time, but often the original purpose is made useless by the amending and the person sponsoring the bill may then withdraw it. Bills on third reading are then voted to pass to the senate or drop; no amending at this time. Of the bills presented many are defeated, many duplicates appear and many are withdrawn.

Appropriation Bills

Appropriation bills are always an important part of the business of the legislature for all state money is appropriated at each session. Ninety-nine appropriation bills passed the last session.

Mrs. Ickes urged the public to attend the session at Springfield, although it does not convene until next winter. Personal letters from constituents are taken seriously and are usually answered, so the public is urged to write opinions on bills being presented.

Mrs. Ickes held the rapt attention of her audience with her vast amount of legislative information and humorous anecdotes.
