Another source of income for this purpose is the Thrift shop, which is operated jointly by the following organizations: The Northwestern Settlement, The Infant Welfare society, and the Woman's Auxiliary of the Highland Park hospital. Each of these organizations is responsible for the operation of the shop two days each week.

The auxiliary, in accepting this contribution from the committee representing the Community shop, appreciates not only the gift, but the recognition of the need of this particular kind of service to the community.
