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INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING MAGIC CIRCLE. Cut out circle, lay on sheet of plain paper with carbon paper between, fasten to table with pin through center spot. Mark short perpendicular line on plain paper close to bottom edge of circle as starting point. Turn circle around until No. 1 is at starting point, then trace over line marked No. 1 inside the circle. Turn circle around to No. 2 at starting line No. 2 inside circle and so on.

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## Deerfield-Shields High School Notes

### LIGHTWEIGHTS DOWN MORTON 15 TO 13

Displaying a fast attack, snappy passing, and a fair eye for the basket, Deerfield's lightweight five downed Morton of Cicero 15 to 13 last Friday night.

The heavies lost just as Al Spohrer lost to Art Shires in their recent fistic encounter in Boston. In both of these contests any other result would have been amazing. Morton's heavies defeated Proviso in the thirties somewhere, so Morton beat us 32-18. Morton's team seems to be of the same calibre as their championship team of last year.

#### Lights Slow at Start

The lights got off to a slow start, the score being but 6 to 3 at the half, in favor of the team from Cicero. Then the third quarter started with a mad scramble for the ball which ended with Morton in possession of it on the free throw line. Brunke was the man to sink the free shot, putting Morton four points ahead of us.

Then Rogan started things going for the Blue and White with a pretty field goal. "Mike" Maloney and Nemanich of Morton collided in a double foul, and Mike made his free throw but the Morton lad failed to retaliate on his.

Morton made a long one, and Joe Cummings of Deerfield tried so hard to make up for it that he lost a long shot and then stumbled to the floor. A few minutes later Joe was again down by the basket and made one from underneath the net, although fouled by a Mortonian. Joe made his free throw with a vengeance.

#### We Forge Ahead

Then a snappy play from center brought Maloney down to the basket, where he put Deerfield ahead 11 to 9. Somehow Morton then snatched the lead away from Deerfield and was leading 13 to 12 in the last quarter.

Maloney's free throw, however, brought Deerfield to a tie, and then Leo Zanier made the crowd go batty by dribbling down to the middle of the floor, pausing to gain his balance, and loosing a long high shot that swished through the net and brought gooseflesh to a number of Deerfield fans.

#### Game Over

The game was now won, for although Morton got away to another shot it bounced off the rim of the backboard before it sank through the net.

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### TRACK SEASON TO START SOON; PRACTICE BEGINS

Deerfield's trackmen have been getting into shape since last Monday for the indoor and outdoor season, though no definite dates have been announced as yet for future meets. The speedsters have been alternating with light workouts and stiffer ones. Aside from a few stiff muscles everything is rosy.

A number of men are back from last year on the senior squad, but so far there are no veterans at all on the junior aggregation, since only freshmen are to be found in this bunch. This gives everybody an equal chance.

The cinder-burners (and tan-bark-burners) which may be seen nightly on the indoor track in the boys' gym include Tucker, the quarter-miler; Miller, the miler; Douglas, Campbell, and Liske, sprinters; "Sheik" Worthington on the hurdles; Carr, porter, and Fell brothers, distance men; and Dougherty, Graham, and Ray, miscellaneous; besides a number of other trackmen who saw experience last year.

### EXPERIMENT WITH ULTRA-VIOLET RAYS

Ten ultra-violet lights have been temporarily installed at Deerfield-Shields in an attempt to lessen the number of absences, due to sickness, during the winter months.

Next semester light treatments will be given seventh period only. In order to make it pay to install this lighting equipment it will be necessary to have a hundred boys and a hundred girls taking these treatments. One-half of the students will be freshmen and one-half will be sophomores.

Each student will be under the light for three minutes. The lights are divided, five on each side of the room. First the student walks past the light facing it and then he goes over to the other side of the room where he walks with his back to the light. While under the light it is necessary for the student to wear goggles, as the lights are so bright.

The physical condition of students taking these treatments will be compared with that of other students in the school, who are not taking the treatments. The students' grades will also be compared.

Any students desiring to take these ultra-violet light treatments must bring a written permit from their parents giving their consent.

If the experiment does not prove a success the school will not be obliged to purchase the lighting equipment.

### FORMER DRAMA DIRECTOR HAS POSITION AT YALE

Miss Constance Welsh, former Deerfield-Shields drama director, has received a position on the teaching staff at Yale university, New Haven, Massachusetts.

Miss Welsh taught at Deerfield-Shields for two years, 1924-1926, and upon leaving here, became a director of dramatics at the University of West Virginia. This year she has been promoted to the position of a professor of diction at Yale.

### DEERFIELD HEAVIES LOSE TO MORTON

The chorus is sponsored by the National Music Supervisor's conference which will hold its biennial meeting in Chicago March 24 to 28.

Rehearsals will be held twice a day during that week under the direction of Dr. Hollis Dann of the University of New York and the public performances will be given in the Auditorium on March 28.

Ruth Drake, who will represent Deerfield-Shields music department, is a first soprano in the Girls' Glee club and has appeared as a soloist in several school and community programs. She took the title role in the musical comedy, "Cleopatra" at the Annual Spring concert last year.
