ing was capitalized in the Exposition of 1893.

Now, once more, the chance is near at hand for Chicago and her suburbs to show the world that in spite of her "domestic cussedness" she is at heart sound, and worthy of being what she truly is, the center of the educational activities of the world.

The purpose of the approaching Fair is to show, dramatically, the forces in action which have built the world in the past, are building now and will build it in the future. With this purpose in mind it will be an exposition of not only industrial, but also the human side of progress. To quote Dr. Shepherd, "The mark of progress is not the big things men do, but the big lives children are given a chance to lead."

The Fair buildings which are being patterned after some in Germany will be two and a half stories high, with escalators between floors. The expositions will begin at the top. As one proceeds downwards he may rest betimes on so-called "set-backs" or roofs where there will be easy chairs set among growing shrubs and trees.

Even those unable to attend the Fair in person may later see and hear the whole thing as recorded on film, the lectures, exhibits, pageants, parades, in large and in detail from all angles.

The project is being supported in every way possible by various interests, by public spirited men and by personal subscription.

Chicago is giving her land and her hospitality. Let us open our doors to our guests as true hosts and not as mere showmen, remembering that Chicago's light which is often concealed beneath a bushel, can be, as it is to many now, a source of beauty and inspiration to all the peoples of the earth.
