

## E. C. IREDALE'S DEATH CAUSES SORROW HERE

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lodge No. 1316, B. O. P. E. Elks. In 1921 he served for a year as exalted ruler of the local Elks' lodge, and was also a trustee for a period of six years.

Mr. Iredale was a consistent member and past president of the "Kickers' club," the group of Evanston business men which meets informally for luncheon every day. He rarely missed a day at these meetings.

"He was a director of the Commercial Trust and Savings bank, and in his activities outside of Evanston he was connected with warehousemen's associations. Among these was the Illinois Furniture Warehousemen's association, of which he was president in 1929, retiring shortly before his illness. He was also active in the National Furniture Warehousemen's association.

### Member of Zoning Board

In city affairs, he was a member of the Evanston Zoning commission and the local Zoning Board of Appeals, by appointment of Mayor Bartlett.

At one time Mr. Iredale was director of the choir at St. Mark's Episcopal church and he was a member of the First Congregational church.

Funeral services were held last Saturday afternoon at two o'clock in the First Congregational church, Evanston, conducted by the pastor, Dr. Hugh Elmer Brown. The interment at Rosehill was ornate. The pallbearers were Mayor Charles H. Bartlett, George E. Davis, Charles H. Reynolds, George H. Tomlinson, Dean Ralph B. Dennis and Dr. C. E. Richards, all of Evanston.
