## HIGH SCHOOL P. T. A. TO HEAR McCORMICK

Principal of LaSalle-Peru High Will Tell of Work There; Date Is Feb. 6

Mr. C. J. McCormick, principal of the LaSalle-Peru Township high school, will speak at the next Deerfield P. T. A. meeting Thursday, Feb. 6, in the auditorium of the Deerfield-Shields high school.

Mr. McCormick is a pioneer in progressive education in Illinois. He will speak on "Education of the Emotions," drawing upon his experiences in the analysis of individual problems among his students in the LaSalle-Peru high school.

### Individual Problems

He was the first principal in the state of Illinois to take up and diagnose individual student problems, and established the psychiatric clinic long before it was thought of in most schools. Cooperating with the Chicago Institute of Juvenile Research, the LaSalle-Peru high school has done remarkable work in helping students in their home, personal, vocational and educational problems.

In the LaSalle-Peru Township high school every student is given a psychological examination as soon as they enter. A close point of contact is also maintained during the course of his high school career.

Cases that involve difficult problems are handled by the Institute of Juvenile Research, not only because they are better equipped to handle unusual cases, but also because they will be able to meet the students involved on a purely impersonal plane.

### Is Successful

Mr. McCormick has been so successful in his work in the LaSalle-Peru high school that he has succeeded in interesting a large number of wealthy citizens of the community to the extent of making large personal contributions for carrying on this work.

Mr. McCormick is a humanist who has always been interested in personal character development. Articles by him have frequently appeared in educational magazines. He has also published a number of monographs on his work and the conclusions at which he has arrived in character citizenship training.
