The recital began with Le Caeser Frank Sonata for violin and piano, followed by groups of various compositions. Her execution was little short of marvelous impeccable intonation, her technique is flawless.

Prelude No. 8 (with tempered clari-chord) Bach, Gordon Campbell was exquisitely done, her tone was of great warmth and color. Bulgarian Rhapsody, Wladigeroff was an exhibition of violin virtuosity which pleased her audience immensely.

### Cricket on the Hearth to Be Given Here Feb. 6

On Thursday, February 6, at 8:30 p. m., the Chicago Art theatre will present Dickens' "Cricket on the Hearth" in the Elm Place school auditorium, with a special matinee for students at 3:30 of the same day.

"Cricket on the Hearth" is an idyll of home and fireside — a charming story of the joys and sorrows of people who are "just folks" the world over, and the story is given to the accompaniment of the cricket's song and the bubbling of the kettle on the fire.

The cast consists of Tilly Slowboy, the loyal little slave, adored by children everywhere; "Dot," the young wife of simple, good-natured John Peerybingle, who so nearly makes tragedy of the play; the Mysterious Stranger, who remains a mystery until the last act; Caleb Plummer, who in the midst of abject poverty builds a beautiful dream-world for his blind daughter, Bertha. And for romance there is the lovely May Fielding, whose ambitious mother tries to force her into marriage with the villain, the greedy, selfish Tackleton, who is pictured as only Dickens could portray such a character.

"Cricket on the Hearth" was one of the most successful and popular of the Moscow Art Theatre productions. It was equally successful when it was produced at the Chicago Art theatre by Ivan Lazareff. Since then the company has presented it in various of our western universities, at many clubs in and around Chicago, and in the suburbs.

### FINE FACULTY FOR TRAINING SCHOOL

**Leadership Courses Planned by  
Deerfield-Shields Sunday  
School Association**

Final arrangements have been made for the Community Leadership Training school to be held under the auspices of the Deerfield-Shields-Township Sunday School association with the churches of Deerfield, Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Highwood, Highland Park, Glencoe, and Northbrook cooperating.

The school will open on Monday evening, February 3, at 7:45, in the Highland Park Presbyterian church, and continue for six Monday evenings. The courses which will be offered are "The Study of the Pupil," "Primary Materials and Methods," "Junior Materials and Methods," and "Intermediate-Senior Materials and Methods." All of these courses are accredited by the denominational Boards of Christian Education and by the International Council of Religious Education, and those completing the work will receive credit toward the Leadership Training Diploma.

#### Instructors

Dr. H. C. Coffman of Northwestern university will teach "The Study of the Pupil." Dr. Coffman is a specialist in child problems and plans to make the course as practical as possible, using the experience of the class as the basis of class discussion. A text book will also be required. It is hoped the parents will come into this class as well as church school teachers, for they will find it helpful in solving their common problem—that of developing the spiritual life of the child.

Miss Bertha Wheelock, superintendent of the primary department, Wilmette Congregational church, an ardent worker in the Chicago Graded union, and associated with the Congregational church school work, will teach "Primary Materials and Methods." Primary workers will find Miss Wheelock's class exceedingly helpful.

Dr. Marian O. Hawthorne of Northwestern university will teach "Junior Materials and Methods." Dr. Hawthorne is widely known for her contributions in the field of religious education.

Miss Marian L. Norris of the International Council of Religious Education will teach "Intermediate-Senior Materials and Methods." Miss Norris has been teaching this course in various parts of the country and comes to us with a mind alert to the needs of young people.

The registration fee will be nominal and that plus the cost of a text book is the only expense which class members will have. Parents, teachers, officers, and workers in the Sunday schools of this north shore district are invited to register in the school.

Dr. Earl D. Fritsch of Highland Park is the registrar and those interested are requested to send their registrations to him. Miss Gladys M. Greenlaw of Highland Park is dean of the school and for further information call Dr. Fritsch, H. P. 275 or 1105, or Miss Greenlaw, H. P. 683 or 3175.
