

### FORGERY CHARGE IN BARRINGTON MIXUP

#### Claim That Number of Bonds of Municipality are Bogus; Official Missing

Barrington's special assessment bond scandal that has brought charges of forged bonds ranging from \$9,000 to \$20,000, today developed definite action through the issuance of a criminal warrant for the arrest of Roger D. Hay, attorney in charge of the bond department, according to Mayor John Cadwallader.

Hay, who was employed in the office of Village Attorney U. J. Hagenjos, is charged with forgery and illegal use of the village seal in warrants issued before Justice of the Peace Ward of Park Ridge that were signed by Village Treasurer Waterman.

"There are \$9,000 in forged bonds that I have seen. I do not know of any more of my own knowledge," the mayor stated.

An auditing firm is investigating the entire special assessment issue for the village, and Zoucks, Eckert and Peterson, a Chicago law firm, is acting for the village in the case.

Duplicate issue of the bonds first appeared in Barrington banks and alarmed the officials. For several days the matter was kept secret.

Attorney Howard P. Sastle, former village attorney, appeared at the meeting Monday and urged the city pay all people holding forged bonds so that the credit of the village will not suffer. The First National bank, that sold several of the spurious issues, will meet payment on these, it is learned.

Hay has been missing from Barrington since Dec. 17, 1929.—Waukegan Sun.

### State Bowling Tourney To Be Held at Waukegan In April; Is Big Affair

The thirty-second annual tournament of the Illinois State Bowling association will be held in Waukegan, beginning about April 15 and extending thereafter for four or five weeks, according to an announcement just received from the executive committee of the association by P. J. Butler, chairman of the local committee which has been working for the meet. It is expected that more than 900 teams will be entered in the event, which will be one of the most important of its kind ever to be held in Waukegan.

The meet has never before been held outside of the city of Chicago and competition among cities for the honor of conducting the tourney was keener than usual this year. Matt Shiel, manager of the Waukegan Recreation rooms, has been working hard for the event and announced himself highly elated over the outcome of the campaign. The Waukegan bowling room has sixteen alleys, which is just enough to make it eligible for the state tournament.

### Stratton Establishes New Standards in the Handling of State Fund

New standards have been established in the handling of public funds by Secretary of State Stratton, according to an informal report issued by his office yesterday. The secretary, according to this statement, not only has produced a new source of revenue for the state by

collecting and turning over interest on revenue from automobile licenses and other sources, but has established a system of surety bonds which protects the state against any possible losses.

Another point to which the statement attaches importance was the fact that funds received from Cook county now are deposited in Chicago banks and downstate receipts go to downstate banks. Under Mr. Strat-

ton's predecessors, it is said, all the receipts of the secretary's office found their way to a single downstate bank which paid no interest.

The report also states that the receipts of the department in 1929 were \$1,960,764 greater than they were in 1928—the total for the former year being \$17,087,209 — and that this greater volume of business was handled with no increase in the number of employes.
