

State Agriculture Head Sees Many Ways Whereby Farmers May Be Assisted

Clarence F. Buck, director of the state department of agriculture, in a forward look over the coming year, sees many possibilities to be of service to the farmers of Illinois.

In his forecast he says: "This department will, in 1930, put forth every possible effort for the assistance of agriculture, the purpose for which the department was created and is maintained by the state. United efforts on the part of all who serve in this department will be insisted upon

for this accomplishment. New laws, and revision of existing statutes, effected during the last session of the state legislature, offer greater opportunities for public service.

Reorganization of the department forces, and revision in the regulations, under way in recent weeks, will tend to improve and expand the work assigned to this department and its various divisions." Remapping of the state for more frequent food inspections; extension of the campaign against tuberculosis in livestock; renewed activity in seed inspection and removal of plant diseases and blight; increased efforts for improvement of poultry; co-ordination of effort for ad-

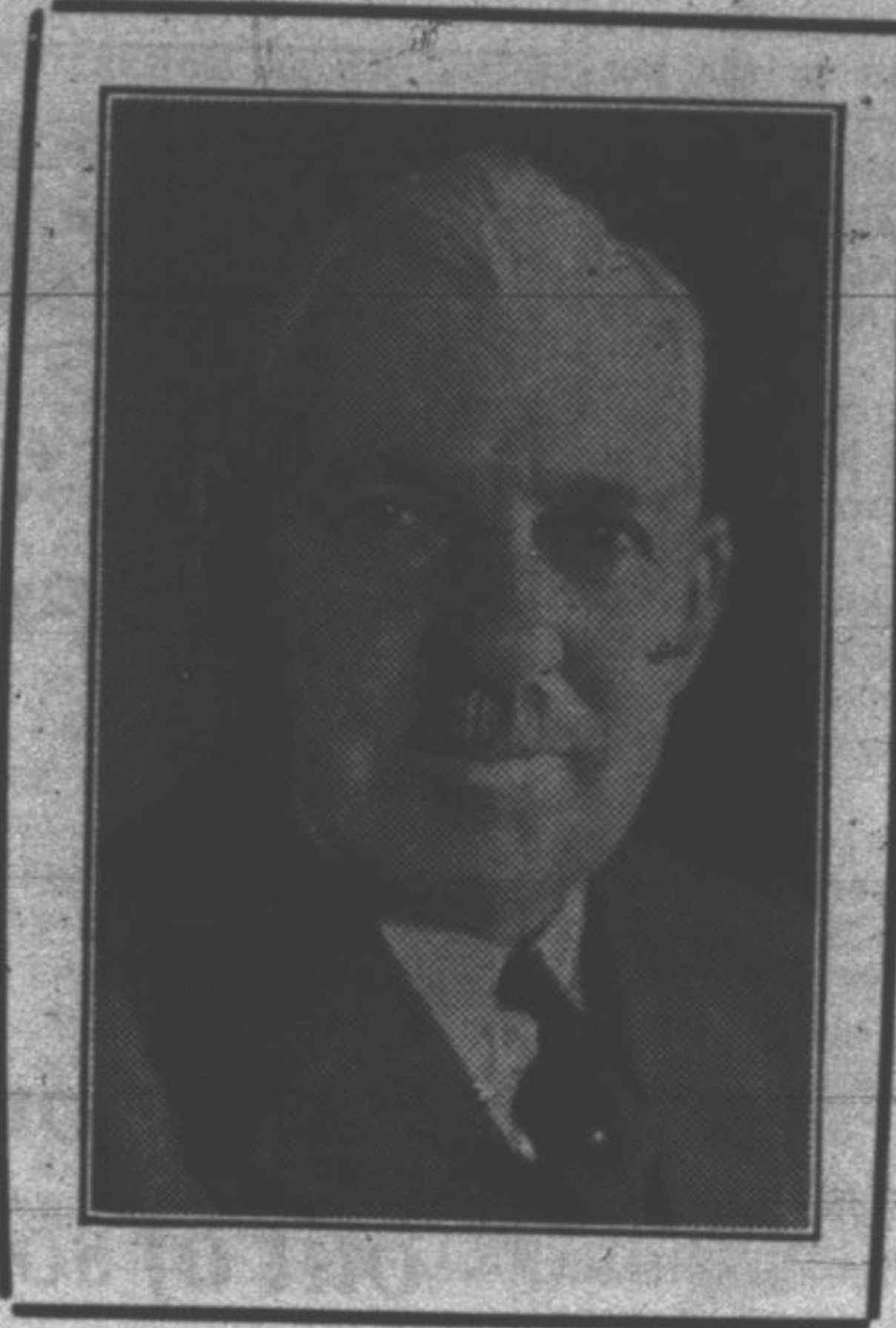
vancement of dairying; enforcement of new law requiring content-labels on closed packages of fruits and vegetables; co-operation with the federal service in crop and livestock reports and estimates; promotion of the beekeeping industry—these are an outline of the work to be accomplished during the new year, as seen by Director Buck.
